11	AFFIRMING THE PARTNERSHIP OF SANTA FE COUNTY AND THE CITY OF
12	SANTA FE TO DEVELOP STRATEGIES AND TAKE ACTIONS TO END
13	HOMELESSNESS.

15	WHEREAS, the nation is experiencing one of the most severe affordable housing crises
16	in history, significantly impacting communities of color and those who live in poverty (National
17	Alliance to End Homelessness, 2020); and
18	WHEREAS, eight million Americans of low-income households pay at least half their
19	income toward housing, putting them at risk of housing instability and homelessness (National
20	Alliance to End Homelessness, 2020); and
21	WHEREAS, in 2019 approximately 13 percent of Santa Fe County residents reported an
22	income below the federal poverty level (US Census Bureau American Community Survey of
23	Median Earnings for Worker 5-Year Estimates 2019); and
24	WHEREAS, Santa Fe County had a larger number of cost-burdened homeowners per
25	capita than did New Mexico and the United States in 2020, with 78 percent of renters below 30

percent of Area Median Income (AMI) and 74 percent of renters between 31 percent and 60 percent 2 of AMI being cost burdened. (Santa Fe Housing Report, Santa Fe Association of Realtors, 2020); 3 and

4 WHEREAS, in Santa Fe City, 86 percent of renter households earning less than \$50,000 a year are cost burdened, a number that has risen by 13 percent between 2016 and 2018 (Santa Fe 6 Housing Report, Santa Fe Association of Realtors, 2020); and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Santa Fe and Santa Fe County have a history of supporting efforts to assist people experiencing homelessness; and

9 WHEREAS, according to the New Mexico Mortgage Finance Authority, there was an 10 estimated shortage of 7,343 affordable rental units in the Santa Fe Metropolitan Statistical Area in 11 2020 (Santa Fe Housing Report, Santa Fe Association of Realtors, 2020); and

12 WHEREAS, economic and societal factors such as a lack of affordable housing, a lack of 13 adequate income, a lack affordable and accessible healthcare including behavioral health care, 14 discrimination, domestic violence, and other systemic social challenges can cause homelessness; 15 and

16 WHEREAS, as of August 2022, the New Mexico Coalition to End Homelessness 17 Coordinated Entry System, which is not yet tracking all homeless people in Santa Fe, recorded a 18 total of 363 individuals, 49 families, and 18 homeless youth in Santa Fe, with 205 individuals being 19 chronically homeless, 22 being chronically homeless veterans, and a disproportionate number of 20 Native American and African American people experiencing homelessness; and

21 WHEREAS, the ongoing pandemic has brought additional awareness to the issue of 22 homelessness and housing instability and has created an opportunity for government entities, 23 politicians, non-profit service providers, private foundations, Santa Fe residents, and other 24 interested stakeholders to work collectively to address this long-standing community issue; and

WHEREAS, the City of Santa Fe is a partner in the Built for Zero Initiative, a national

1 movement where communities assist each other in developing and following evidence-based 2 strategies for reducing and ending homelessness; and

WHEREAS, Santa Fe County has recently opened a behavioral health crisis center, La Sala, to better address the needs of people experiencing a behavioral health crisis; and

WHEREAS, Santa Fe County developed the CONNECT network, now a City and County partnership providing services related to the social determinants of health; and

WHEREAS, these efforts by the City and County to combat housing insecurity and homelessness are being coordinated with those of philanthropic foundations and non-profit partners in an initiative known as the S3 (Safe, Stable, and Supportive) Santa Fe Housing Initiative; and

10 WHEREAS, the Anchorum St. Vincent Foundation, Thornburg Foundation, McCune Charitable Foundation, Frost Foundation and Santa Fe Community Foundation have provided 12 funding to address immediate needs and longer-term solutions to homelessness since the beginning 13 of the pandemic; and

14 WHEREAS, the vision of this partnership is for public and private partners to work 15 collaboratively with community providers and advocacy groups to ensure that Santa Fe is a place 16 where homelessness is rare, brief, and non-recurring, and that access to safe, affordable, and 17 sustainable housing is a reality for all community members; and

18 WHEREAS, analysis of existing providers and housing options conducted as part of the 19 S3 Santa Fe Housing Initiative indicates that the overall housing system in the Santa Fe area has 20 been functioning with insufficient support and infrastructure.

of Santa Fe agree to focus efforts in the following six areas through the S3 Santa Fe Housing
Initiative:

3 1. PRESERVATION AND PREVENTION: Increase resources and develop strategies 4 to prevent homelessness, including the preservation of existing affordable housing and 5 enhanced utilization of social services; increased financial supports, such as the City 6 and County Affordable Housing Trust Funds, to prevent homelessness and stabilize 7 those who are precariously housed; and support for local regulation and land use policy 8 changes that increase housing stability for residents. 9 EMERGENCY SHELTER: 2. Create and further develop collective community 10 agreements specific to emergency shelter provision, including expanding options for 11 emergency shelter care to include safe and legal outdoor sleeping spaces and non-12 congregate shelter and improving shelter access to housing and supportive service 13 resources. 14 BUILDINGS/HOUSING UNITS: Quantify the need for additional affordable units, 3. 15 and through new construction, conversion, subsidization, and redevelopment, increase 16 the local affordable housing stock inventory with a goal of at least 100-200 units per 17 year. 18 4. INDIVIDUAL VOUCHERS/PROGRAM BASED VOUCHERS: Increase funding 19 for housing vouchers, both short and long term, and develop strategies to ensure that 20 those vouchers can be flexibly utilized in ways that promote equity and housing choice; 21 and ensure that existing voucher programs are expended in full. 22 5. SUPPORTIVE SERVICES: Ensure all interested individuals and families 23 participating in housing programs have high-quality crisis intervention, behavioral healthcare, and other supportive services to maintain safe housing. 24 25 SYSTEM INFRASTRUCTURE: Continue development of the community-wide 6.

homeless response system which includes strategic planning and clarifying the roles, function, and authority of each partner. The system development will include collective identification of system gaps through collecting accurate data, creation of cooperative strategies to address gaps, and consistent cross-agency communication on funding opportunities, housing initiatives and overall system development. Summary:				

Joint resolution affirming the County and City's partnership to develop and take actions to address homelessness by securing and stabilizing housing and social services for its most vulnerable residents; the efforts will be focused on six key areas through the S3 Santa Fe Housing Initiative 1. Preservation and Prevention, 2. Emergency Shelter, 3. Buildings/Housing Units, 4. Individual Vouchers/Program Based Vouchers, 5. Supportive Services and 6. System Infrastructure.

#### **Departments Affected:**

Community Health and Safety, Office of Affordable Housing, Land Use, Community Engagement, Public Works, Human Resources, City Attorney's Office and Mayor's Office

#### **Consequences of Not Enacting Legislation:**

If the resolution is not adopted, the City will continue to operate in a silo without formal partnership with the County or other partners. There would not be a aligned contribution towards creating a more effective way to address the gaps in the homeless and housing system.

#### Conflict, Duplication, Companionship, or Relationship to Other Legislation:

None identified.

#### **Performance and Administrative Implications:**

To build lasting infrastructure for this work, expanded staffing and financial support will be needed to sustain the collective efforts. Currently a full time Program Manager in the Youth and Family Services Division and a part-time consultant is dedicated to coordinating this work, Additional staffing through new positions or reassignments would be necessary to ensure sustainability, prioritization of efforts, clear communication, and continued coordination of the work.

#### **Fiscal Implications:**

Continuing to keep the response to homelessness as is, would continue to significantly impact City resources. Dedicating funding towards a collaborative effort with goals and objectives towards a more efficient system will be cost effective in the long term and will reduce the pressure on numerous public and private systems. Currently a million dollars in ARPA funding is allocated to support various projects that support the goals of the resolution.
