11	IN SUPPORT OF THE INVESTIGATION AND PROSECUTION OF THE PERSONS		
12	RESPONSIBLE FOR THE EFFORT TO CRIMINALLY INTERFERE WITH OR		
13	OVERTURN THE RESULTS OF THE 2020 PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION THAT		
14	CULMINATED IN THE JANUARY 6, 2021, ATTACK UPON THE UNITED STATES		
15	CAPITOL; AND CALLING FOR THE PASSAGE OF FEDERAL AND STATE LAWS		
16	TO GREATLY REDUCE THE RISKS OF FUTURE INSURRECTIONS AND EFFORTS		
17	TO DELAY, DISRUPT, OR OVERTURN ELECTIONS AND TO BETTER PROTECT		
18	AND SAFEGUARD THE ELECTION PROCESS.

20	WHEREAS, the Governing Body of the City of Santa Fe respects the will of the voters		
21	to choose their representatives and to maintain democracy in the United States of America		
22	("America"); and		
23	WHEREAS, certain public figures have alleged claims of election fraud, including		
24	allegations of fraud during the 2020 presidential election, most, if not all, of which have been		
25	unsubstantiated; and		

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WHEREAS, false and unsubstantiated claims of election fraud undermine the faith of the American people in the election process; and

WHEREAS, claims of fraud related to the 2020 presidential election culminated in the violent insurrection attack on the United States Capitol on January 6, 2021; and

WHEREAS, according to the Washington Post approximately 291 candidates for office in the 2022 general elections have communicated that they questioned the results of the 2020 presidential election or support claims that it was fraudulently decided; according to the New York Times, at least 220 candidates who cast doubt or denied the results of the 2020 presidential election won in the 2022 midterm elections; and

WHEREAS, unsubstantiated claims of election fraud may result in the repression of votes, including, but not limited to votes of minorities; such unsubstantiated claims may also result in the creation of policies and procedures whereby secretaries of state and/or state legislatures may overturn the votes of the people; and

WHEREAS, a poll conducted by the Brennan Center for Justice found that one in six local election officials in the United States reported experiencing threats because of their jobs and that 30% of election officials polled knew election workers who left their job at least in part because of fears for their safety due to increased threats or intimidation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE THAT IT

- Supports the finding of facts, conclusions, and recommendations contained in the final report of the United States House Select Committee to Investigate the January 6th Attack on the United States Capitol dated December 22, 2022; and
- Condemns and will not tolerate unlawful attempts by any elected officials,
 candidates, special interest groups, or other actors to disregard the will of the voters
 and override the results of a free and fair election and defends the federal and state

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Constitutions and the democratic republic from such attempts; and

- 3. Calls upon federal, state, and local law enforcement, and courts, as applicable, to fully investigate the facts of unlawful attempts to nullify and overthrow the results of the 2020 presidential election that culminated in the January 6, 2021, violent attack on the U.S. Capitol; determine the identity and scope of the involvement of each person who planned, conspired with or directed, aided and/or abetted others and/or directly participated in the attack on the U.S. Capitol on that day; and, further, prosecute each such person to the full extent of the law and hold him or her fully accountable for his or her actions; and
- 4. Calls upon the United States Congress to enact legislation to eliminate ambiguities and uncertainties in existing law concerning the transfer of presidential power as set forth in the United States Constitution and the Electoral Count Act to ensure that the vote of the majority of qualified voters, not the decision of any state legislature or any other governmental person(s), shall determine the outcome of election of the President of the United States; and to set forth clearly and thoroughly the process of certification of the electoral votes for President by the members of the House and Senate on the January 6th occurring after each presidential election, and determine what grounds should be required for any refusal to certify the electoral count; and
- 5. Stands with election workers who are facing threats and intimidation, recognizes that election officials are essential workers who work tirelessly to ensure that the voice of the people is heard, and calls upon Congress and state legislatures to enact legislation to protect election officials and to provide adequate funding to carry out secure and safe elections; and
- 6. Calls upon Congress and state legislatures to enact legislation to provide consistent and adequate funding at both the state and federal levels to make operational

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1	planning and security plans timely and robust.
