Guadalupe and Jefferson Street: A Brief History

- 1776-1796 Santuario de Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe
- Early 1800s Guadalupe & Jefferson Street Named Formal Streets
- 1887 to 1941 Santa Fe Branch of Chili Line runs from Railyard North along Guadalupe & Jefferson.
- 1923: "Jefferson street is to be widened ten feet. This improvement was announced by City engineer W. Guy Turley, who says the owners of property on that street should be complimented generously in donating land to the city. Mr. Turley sees in the widening of Jefferson street the reduction of a great hazard, for the D.& R.G. railway runs along that street, at present quite narrow."






1954 Santa Fe built a new preferred entrance from the north, directing traffic to use the street (then known as Jefferson) instead of the Old Taos Highway.

- Post-1960s Road Expansions Downtown
- **1961** St. Frances is Complete
- **1974** Taos Highway Closes and Guadalupe Formal Highway Connector to Hwy 84/285



- 2012-2013 Constituent Concerns for Pedestrian Safety and Speed Expressed to Council
- 2013 Santa Fe MPO and City Respond with Recommendation for Road Safety Audit
- 2014 MPO includes Gudalupe Street improvements in the 2015 Metropolitan Transportation Plan
- **2016** Funds Programmed into the MPO Transportation Improvement Plan in the amount of \$4 million.
- 2018 MPO partners with SFCC to produce the Guadalupe Street Project Digital Media Video to raise awareness of the project.

Long-Term Goals – "All Trips Have Equal Value" 2022 City of Santa Fe Complete Streets Resolution Guadalupe Street is one of many projects that the City has pledged to support transitioning from early to mid-twenty century values of moving large volume of vehicles to creating safe and economical vibrant public spaces.



Santa Fe Multimodal Transition Plan



Adopted in 2022 – Downtown Reference: 54% land is dedicated to streets and parking of that, 70% of that is devoted to travel lanes and parking indicating that overall 41% of land is used for motor vehicles (either moving or parked).
