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10	A RESOLUTION
11	IN SUPPORT OF GOVERNOR LUJAN GRISHAM'S CALL TO PASS GUN REFORMS,
12	INCLUDING A BAN ON THE SALE OF ASSAULT WEAPONS.
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14	WHEREAS, the Governor of New Mexico, Michelle Lujan Grisham, called for a ban on
15	the sale of assault weapons, an end to the state loophole on straw purchases of guns, safe storage
16	reforms, and a law allowing victims of gun violence to bring civil suits against firearm
17	manufacturers during her State of the State address on January 17, 2023; and
18	WHEREAS, Governor Lujan Grisham said, "We all know that we cannot keep our people
19	safe, we can't keep our police officers and their families safe, if weapons of war continue to flood
20	our neighborhoods"; and
21	WHEREAS, in the City's Resolution establishing City of Santa Fe legislative priorities
22	for c2023, the Governing Body supported and endorsed the creation of a New Mexico Office of
23	Gun Violence Prevention; adoption of a Child Access Prevention ("CAP") law; raising the age of
24	purchase for certain rifles; and a ban on assault-style weapons; and
25	WHEREAS, according to statistics for the most recent year available compiled by the

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1 Educational Fund to Stop Gun Violence (EFSGV), there were 471 gun violence deaths in New 2 Mexico in 2019, including 40 children and teens; and 3 WHEREAS, EFSGV data shows that the firearm homicide rate in New Mexico increased 4 one hundred fifteen percent from 2014 to 2019, and that New Mexico ranks eight in the country 5 for the highest firearm homicide rate; and 6 WHEREAS, EFSGV provides that young men of color are disproportionately impacted 7 by firearm homicide in New Mexico, and that American Indian/Alaska Native, Black, and 8 Hispanic/Latino males aged 15-34 all have higher firearm homicide rates than White males of the 9 same age group; and 10 WHEREAS, according to Everytown for Gun Safety (Everytown), an average of 433 11 people die and 618 people are wounded by gun violence in New Mexico annually; and 12 WHEREAS, according to Everytown, New Mexico has the twelfth highest rate of gun 13 violence in the United States, with the rate of gun deaths increasing 53 percent from 2011 to 2020 14 (compared to a 33 percent increase nationwide); and 15 WHEREAS, Sandy Hook Promise argues that gun violence and school shootings are a 16 uniquely American epidemic, and provides that 12 children in America die each day due to gun 17 violence; and 18 WHEREAS, Sandy Hook Promise data tells us that guns are the leading cause of death 19 among American children and teens; and 20 WHEREAS, according to Giffords, New Mexico had the seventh-highest gun death rate 21 in the United States in 2020; and 22 WHEREAS, Giffords provides that women in the United States are twenty-one (21) times 23 more likely to be killed with a gun than women in other high-income countries, and that Black and 24 Latino communities account for more than three-quarters of gun homicide victims while making 25 up less than a third of the U.S. population; and

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WHEREAS, Giffords notes that assault weapons with large-capacity magazines are the weapon of choice for those seeking to cause a mass casualty attack; and

WHEREAS, also according to Giffords:

- "Assault weapons, especially assault rifles, are typically semiautomatic versions
 of weapons created for deadly battlefield purposes. They are designed and
 equipped with features that enable mass killing, including sustained, high-volume
 rapid fire shooting at large numbers of people in a short period of time;"
- "The availability of unusually dangerous weaponry like assault weapons and large-capacity magazines has fueled an alarming increase in high casualty mass shootings across the nation"; and "Perpetrators of many of the deadliest shootings in modern American history—including in Las Vegas, Orlando, Sandy Hook Elementary School, Sutherland Springs, El Paso, Robb Elementary School, Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School, Aurora, and Dayton—used assault weapons equipped with large-capacity magazines";
- "These unusually dangerous weapons also expose law enforcement officers to heightened risk from gunmen wielding increasingly high-powered combat grade weapons on civilian streets";
- "An analysis of public mass shootings resulting in four or more deaths found that more than 85% of such fatalities were caused by assault rifles. An assailant with an assault rifle is able to hurt and kill twice the number of people compared to an assailant with a non-assault rifle or handgun;"
- "During the 10-year period the federal assault weapons ban was in effect, mass shooting fatalities were 70% less likely to occur compared to the periods before and after the ban;" and
- "Studies also suggest that state level assault weapons bans help to prevent mass

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1	shooting deaths."
2	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE
3	CITY OF SANTA FE that the Governing Body supports Governor Lujan Grisham's call for a ban
4	on assault weapons, an end to the state loophole on straw purchases of guns, safe storage reforms,
5	and a law allowing victims of gun violence to bring civil suits against firearm manufacturers.
6	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governing Body directs the City Clerk to send
7	copies of this resolution to the City of Santa Fe State Legislative Delegation and the Governor of
8	New Mexico.
