Chair Bucsher called the meeting of the Santa Fe River Commission to order at 6:07 p.m. at 500 Market Station, Santa Fe, NM. A quorum was established with roll call.

3. Approval of the Agenda

Mr. Bove reminded the Commission that the minutes from January were not approved last month and there was a motion to approve them along with February's minutes. It was decided to approve both sets of minutes tonight and add it to the agenda.

Ms. Hansen moved to approve the Agenda as amended with a second from Mr. Jacobi which passed by voice vote.

4. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES FROM FEBRUARY 11, 2016

Ms. Hansen moved to approve the minutes of January 14, 2016 as presented with a second from Mr. Jacobi which passed by voice vote.

Ms. Hansen moved to approve the minutes of February 11, 2016 as presented with a second from Mr. Sawyer which passed by voice vote.

5. COMMUNICATION FROM OTHER AGENCIES/COMMITTEES

a.) Living River Hydrograph Update-City of SF, Water Resources & Conservation

Mr. Hook presented the Commission with a report on the System (See Exhibit A) that measured and gaged water flows.

A discussion was held on the different areas that are measured. Mr. Hook explained the pulses in the graph and the reasons they are there. The McClure reservoir is starting to fill.

A discussion was held about the weather and the snowpack. Mr. Hook described the issues related to Article 7. Mr. Hook reported that the Buckman Regional Water Treatment Plant will shut down to refurbish some pumps soon, it shouldn't take more than a few weeks.

Mr. Hook reported that testing on the wells are conducted to check uranium and arsenic levels. Those reports are available online. Ms. McDonald will have Mr. Alex Puglisi attend a meeting in the future to address any questions the Commission may have.

Mr. Hook stated they would like to use the City Wells more. The majority of the drinking water is coming from renewable surface water.

Ms. Hansen would like to know how much water is being pulled from the San Juan/Chama. Mr. Hook stated he can get those numbers for her.

Mr. Sawyer was interested in post flow and the months is it released. Mr. Hook sated that is not predicable.

The Commission thanked Mr. Hook for his presentation.

6. INFORMATION/DISCUSSION/ACTION:

a.) Wetlands Action Plan for Santa Fe County-Jan-Willem Jansens

Ms. McDonald introduced Mr. Willem Jansens and the work he has done with the County and the City. Mr. Willem Jansens described in more detail the projects and organizations he has been involved in.

Mr. Willem Jansens presented a flyer (See Exhibit B) explaining what his business does. Mr. William Jansens asked the Commission to introduce themselves and ask a question so that he can direct his talk towards those concerns. The Commission asked very important questions. Mr. Willem Jansens passed out information to each commission member pertaining to their specific questions.

Mr. Willem Jansens presented a slideshow explaining the Santa Fe Wetlands Action Plan. His presentation was very helpful and detailed. The slideshow is available online. After the presentation a brief discussion was held about the scoring system he used.

Mr. Willem Jansens addressed the concern about the beavers and how they inhabited the River passed Agua Fria. Ms. McDonald announced a meeting 3/17/2016 at the La Cienega Community Center to discuss the issue, it will be the beginnings of planning.

The Commission thanked Mr. Willem Jansens for his presentation.

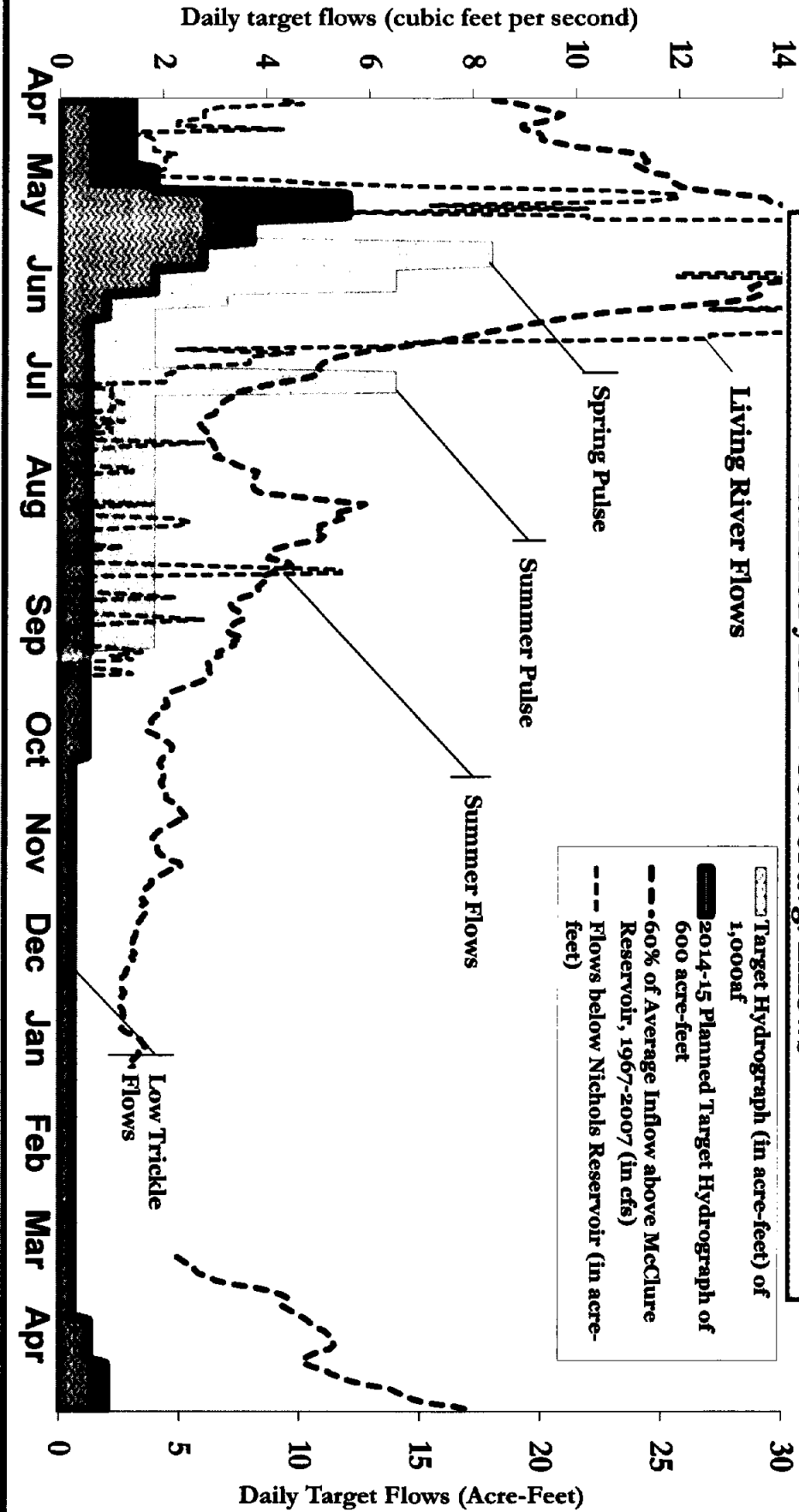

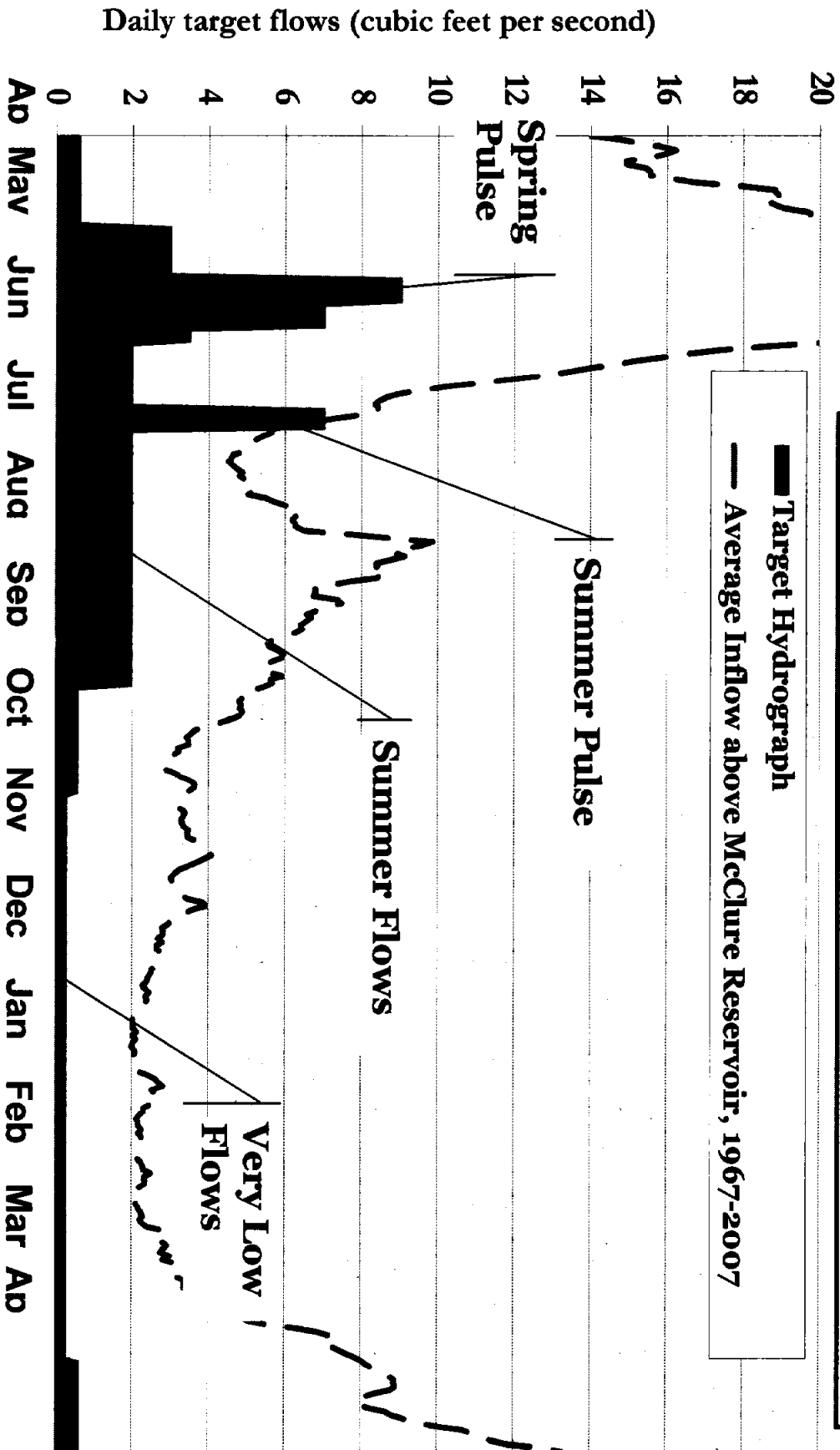
