## 1. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting of the Children and Youth Commission was called to order at 6:00 pm, on Thursday, March 29, 2016, at the Market Station Conference Room, 500 Market Station, Santa Fe, New Mexico.

## 3. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

MOTION

A motion was made by Commissioner Dry, seconded by Commissioner

## 4. APPROVAL OF MINUTES February 23, 2016

Chair Lefrak said she had two corrections. Mittler is the correct spelling of the name and Katie was excused.

**MOTION** A motion was made by Commissioner Dry, seconded by Commissioner Martínez, to approve the minutes as amended.

**VOTE** The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

## 5. **NEW BUSINESS**

## A. DISCUSSION REGARDING VACANT COMMISSION SEAT DANIEL SLAVIN

Chair Lefrak introduced Mr. Slavin and asked him to tell the Commission a bit about himself.

Mr. Slavin said he was from Buffalo, New York, has a Finance Degree and has been here for ten years. He is the Director of Finance for SVHsupport, a local non profit, which is quite large. They merged seven years ago with Christus St. Vincent Hospital and Christus Health and own 50% of the Hospital. They also have a large investment portfolio. Being a part of this Commission goes along with a number of different things that SVHsupport is interested in and their commitment to this community.

Commissioner Dry asked how much grant making do you do.

Mr. Slavin said we are new to it. We gave \$150,000 to United Way and are working with the community. We have given \$2 million to the Hospital and are working with the Community Foundation.

Mr. Sanchez asked what are your thoughts on what our most significant concerns here.

Mr. Slavin said he is a coach for the Santa Fe High School soccer team and a Big Brother. One-on-one relationships are good. Education is a state mandated issue and critical. Here we have high property values, not high taxes and not good schools.

Mr. Sanchez asked do you have a good feel for what we are.

Chair Lefrak asked do you have questions.

Mr. Slavin said he looks at this as another branch of community outreach and seeing where the monies are going.

Mr. Sanchez said we have the Commission, they have \$1.5 million that we fund to organizations. We also have the Mayor's Childrens Cabinet. We bring funders and stakeholders together to design specific indicators and outcomes we want and to

design programs to that end. We are trying to figure out who is doing what and how we design pathways.

Mr. Slavin said we all have to work together.

Mr. Sanchez said we are in a good place. Alignment is the best he has seen it. This is an awesome Commission.

Chair Lefrak said thank you and you will hear from me.

Mr. Slavin left the meeting.

Chair Lefrak asked is there any discussion.

Mr. Sanchez said he has had the opportunity to look into his background and he is highly qualified financially. He would have to recuse himself if we were going to talk about funding for Big Brother Big Sister.

Commissioner Dry asked as a funder is it a conflict for United Way.

Mr. Sanchez said yes because he is on the Board.

Everyone agreed that he was great.

MOTION

A motion was made by Commissioner Martínez, seconded by Commissioner Dry, to approve the selection of Mr. Daniel Slavin as member of the Children and Youth Commission.

VOTE

The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

## B. PRELIMINARY DISCUSSION REGARDING 2016-2017 PROPOSALS

Chair LeFrak said this item is to start a preliminary discussion about the proposals we have received for funding.

Commissioner Dry said there is one organization that she knows of that has organizational tumult and the application did not capture that at all. Non profits go through tough times. That is not captured in the application.

Mr. Sanchez said he talked to them five or six months ago and Ron said

he is going to put his organization through a change. According to the quarterly reports we are getting in, their services have not slipped.

Chair Lefrak said at our next meeting we will come up with a list of organizations we need to speak to. New Vistas will be on there. When things like that come up we will make space to look into that.

Mr. Rodriguez said he is starting to read the proposals. When is the deadline.

Chair Lefrak said by our next Commission meeting on April 26<sup>th</sup>. We might end up adding another meeting around that time. We will determine who we will interview, then have another meeting and finalize who will be receiving funding. We have all been given seven proposals to look at in depth. We all need to have a general sense or overview of the others for the 26<sup>th</sup>. If there are any of your seven that you want to make sure are interviewed let me know.

Mr. Sanchez said we have interviews scheduled for April 21<sup>st</sup>, so by the 15<sup>th</sup> we need the list of names of organizations that you want to come in to be interviewed.

Commissioner Dry said New Vistas.

Chair Lefrak said April 21st and 22nd for interviews, is that correct.

Commissioner Dry said our attitude should be that we are not the experts, the applicants are.

Chair Lefrak said we have over a \$1 million more in requests than money we have.

Mr. Sanchez said he needs to know by April 15<sup>th</sup> of any of your proposal organizations that you feel need to be interviewed.

Mr. Sanchez said on the 26<sup>th</sup> we will discuss who we want to fund. Once that is finalized then he will go to the Finance Committee and the Governing Body and then set up contracts with those approved.

Commissioner Martínez said the April schedule is tough. He needs to look at his calendar.

Mr. Sanchez said If you can't come to the interviews, give us a list of the organizations you want interviewed and the questions you want asked and we will ask them.

Chair Lefrak said the 26<sup>th</sup> is the important meeting to come to because we will be deciding who to fund.

Commissioner Rodriguez asked are the 21st and 22nd during the day.

Chair Lefrak said yes, the work day.

Mr. Sanchez said he is anticipating five to six organizations that will need an interview.

Chair Lefrak said we did twenty minutes for questions per organization last time.

Commissioner Dry said the interviews are only for organizations that you are troubled by.

Chair Lefrak said the Childrens Museum is on her list. Their application is incomplete. She and Chris will talk to the purchasing office. We may have to disqualify them.

Commissioner Dry said Audubon is on mine and they have a strong application, but no balance sheet.

Mr. Sanchez said he will check on that.

Commissioner Dry asked let's say Audubon does not have it, do they get disqualified.

Mr. Sanchez said the applications were supposed to be turned in to Purchasing by 2:00 pm. Gerards House came in at 2:00 pm and twenty seconds. They were disqualified. That is the Purchasing Office requirements. We would have to set the tone. If we do for one we have to do for all. The original packets sometimes have all the financial information. Gerards House and Salazar After School Program did not get it in.

Chair Lefrak said that is brutal.

Mr. Sanchez said he went through Adelante's application and it is strong.

Commissioner Martínez said some of these proposals look good but then you start questioning how you can judge what is on paper vs what they are doing out there and what impact are they having on the community.

Commissioner Dry said some of their methods of evaluation kind of get at

that.

Mr. Sanchez said we have their files here if you want to look at their quarterly reports and access that information.

Commissioner Martínez said if you have a healthy organization that has been around for fifteen years do they really need that help from the Commission to do what they have been doing for fifteen years or can that money go to a struggling organization.

Mr. Sanchez said it is the same as NDI. They are healthy and do they really need the Commission money.

Chair Lefrak said we don't want to penalize them for being a healthy organization.

Mr. Sanchez said the question comes down to if the organization is making an impact on the priorities we have outlined.

Chair Lefrak said it might influence the amount we give them.

Mr. Sanchez said Youth Works just picked up a \$1 million grant.

Commissioner Rodriguez said like an NDI, if they are using their money to give underprivileged kids a scholarship that is a good thing.

Chair Lefrak said for organizations we have funded for many years in a row they depend on receiving funding.

Commissioner Dry said it is the role of the Commission to provide stable support.

Chair Lefrak said Chris is a wealth of information because he does the site visits.

## C. DISCUSSION REGARDING MAYOR GONZALES CHILDREN'S CABINET ACTION PLANS

Mr. Sanchez passed out a hand out which is incorporated into these minutes as Exhibit "1".

Mr. Sanchez said we will keep abreast of the work being done through the Cabinet. This is their Action Plan. He would like to touch base on a couple of items.

Mr. Sanchez said on the first page regarding the Early Childhood Fund, this is one of the Mayor's goals, to try to work on establishing this fund. We are working with a group of early childhood professionals to determine gaps in services and funding. The ideas would be coming through the Commission. There is a suggestion that maybe we will expand the Commission by two or three members who will focus on early childhood education.

Mr. Sanchez said on page 3, Youth Leadership, we are listed there as part of the partnership. He will bring the Commission the information on that as it develops.

Mr. Sanchez said regarding the Homework Diner. It will come through here and is a really cool concept. It is on page 5. They get a free hot meal and academic tutoring.

Commissioner Dry asked who gives the homework support.

Chair Lefrak said organizations and others. It is a mix. They want to have it every day but to start with, it will be two days a week.

Mr. Sanchez said the goal is that the kids will have a hot mean every day. We are working with Food Depot and looking at contracting with them by a reimbursement process for meals served. Everything else will be in kind.

Mr. Sanchez said on page 6 it talks about Career Pathways. Tying into the disconnected youth piece is the big one. Re-engaging youth with skills or trades is what we are looking at. We are looking at partnering with our community and Albuquerque who can come down and design the pathway and have a trades program while kids are in high school and the kids will get a certificate. The goal is to focus on the disconnected youth population of 2,600.

Commissioner Martínez asked does that coincide with the public schools and the building trades programs. Would you connect those people.

Mr. Sanchez said that is for public school kids. You can't be disconnected and come back to that. This focuses on the population that is disconnected, two years out of school, maybe in the corrections system.

Commissioner Rodriguez said this is awesome but one thing he would recommend is it that it is not hard to get a kid a job but keeping the job is the issue. They have not learned the skills to be on time and be responsible and rise through the ranks. That kind of training should be included.

Mr. Sanchez said the business community is talking about soft skills and how do kids get that kind of training.

Mr. Sanchez said pages 8 and 9 focus on disconnected kids.

Commissioner Dry asked so disconnected youth is someone not in school or work.

Mr. Sanchez said historically six months out. Ages sixteen to eighteen is about five hundred kids. Ages eighteen to twenty one is the bigger number.

Commissioner Dry asked what are they doing.

Commissioner Rodriguez said hanging out and getting high.

Mr. Sanchez said we are looking at policy making level funders that we need to work with us and put their finances behind that. He wanted to share this information with the Commissioners.

## 6. OLD BUSINESS

## A. UPDATE ON DATA PROJECT

Chair Lefrak asked Mr. Sanchez, do you have an update from Jill.

Mr. Sanchez said no, but he has gotten feedback from organizations that they are happy to have her. She is making an impact.

## B. FOLLOW UP DISCUSSION WITH ARTS COMMISSION

Chair Lefrak said as we discussed at our last meeting, the Mayor had requested we collaborate with the Arts Commission. He asked us to share funding so we recommended that Jill go into and help the organizations that we both fund instead. The Mayor said he would still like us to contribute some of our money. It would be a separate RFP for an arts organization that works in collaboration with youth organizations. The Mayor requested that we contribute \$30,000.

Commissioner Dry asked is that to keep from overlapping.

Mr. Sanchez said the Mayor wants the arts community and the Youth Commission to come together to fund something that shows arts can help our youth.

Chair Lefrak said it is not necessarily an organization we both fund.

Commissioner Dry asked is it new dollars.

Chair Lefrak said we do have more money than in the past due to GRT

increases.

Commissioner Dry said so he wants to drive that change. You don't want funders to drive the programming.

Mr. Sanchez said the Mayor has a strong will to have city dollars work in partnership to create an impact and for them to collectively come together. It creates efficiency and makes Commissions work together.

Chair Lefrak said so we are going to do that. There are a lot of details to hammer out.

Commissioner Dry asked is it for new programs or existing.

Mr. Sanchez said it should be around a priority or outcome we are hoping to achieve. Such as partnering with an arts organization that focuses on graffiti and making that into murals. We can be creative.

Commissioner Dry said Philadelphia had a hugely successful mural arts program.

Mr. Sanchez said maybe we do an RFP for three \$10,000 grants. Let's use it very creatively.

Commissioner Dry said she would have to see what it really means.

Mr. Sanchez said we are really bringing together the City as a whole.

Chair Lefrak said and since we have more money this year it can work.

Commissioner Dry said sustainability of that is a question.

Chair Lefrak said anyone who wants to work on the RFP, let her know.

Commissioner Dry said she is interested.

## 7. COMMENTS FROM THE CHAIR AND COMMISSION

Commissioner Dry said she is hosting Fiesta Para Bebes again this year on May 7<sup>th</sup>, at the El Camino Real Academy. It is for families with young children age newborn to five. We have lots of organizations coming together that provide services. Hopefully the Mayor will be there.

Commissioner Dry said also as part of her work with baby fund priority areas is

access to an increase to early childhood education and support of the early childhood teachers. They have developed a program for that and have been meeting for a bit now. That group is planning an exhibit called Making Sense of Play. There will be several panels showing why play is important. They will be exhibited at the Community College first then we will send the panels around the City. We will invite the public to participate through Instagram. We would love the Mayor's support. The opening is on June 18<sup>th</sup>.

Mr. Sanchez said give me more information and we will see if we can get a meeting.

Commissioner Dry said if the Mayor could promote and recognize it that would be great.
