3. APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

Judge Sommer added the discussion of the ICM contract under Matters from the Board.

Judge Sommer moved to approve the agenda as amended with a second from Mr. Lindahl which passed by voice vote.

4. INTRODUCTIONS OF BOARD MEMBERS AND GUESTS

Introductions we made by all present.

Words from the Chair-Sam Jackson

Mr. Jackson was not present.

5. APPROVAL OF MINUTES MARCH 17, 2016 AND JUNE 26, 2014

Judge Somer moved to approve the minutes of March 17, 2016 as presented with a second from Mr. Lindahl which passed by voice vote.

Judge Somer moved to approve the minutes of June 26, 2014 as presented with a second from Mr. Trujillo which passed by voice vote.

6. FINANCIAL REPORT

A.) Budget- Detailed Budget and Financial Report

Mr. DeMella presented his Detailed Budget and Financial Report (See Exhibit A). Mr. DeMella explained the amount of \$521.60 was to reimburse him for his travel expenses to Silver City.

A discussion was held about the ICM contract, it was approved by City Council and is with the Mayor for signing. The Mayor was out of town and will sign tomorrow or the beginning of next week.

Mr. DeMella explained there is a balance that can be used for an existing program, he would like input from the Board.

Mr. DeMella reported that the Day Reporting Program has not complied with suppling invoices and reports as per the MOU.

Mr. DeMella explained the matches. Mr. Trujillo asked if the money available has to be used within the next three months. Mr. DeMella stated is does or it will be lost.

Mr. DeMella reviewed the report for the members that were late.

Judge Sommer asked about the issue with the ICM contract and if Ms. Romero is able to bill for the work she is currently doing. Ms. Romero stated she does not want to have to send money back if she is not under contract.

Mr. DeMella stated there is always a break in service with the CYFD contracts. This particular item is currently with the Mayor should be signed tomorrow or early next week, then it will be complete and Ms. Romero can continue working and work with new clients.

Ms. Sandoval asked Ms. Romero to explain the amount per client. Ms. Romero explained it is anywhere from 8 hours for 12-15 clients a week.

Judge Sommer reviewed and read aloud the portion of the minutes from last month where it was decided to Ms. Romero would not take on any new clients until the contract is signed she may present it as a match at a later date.

Judge Sommer presented a letter to the Board from a student on behalf of Ms. Romero describing the help she gives him. (See Exhibit B)

A discussion was held about this issue that happens every year. The programs are underfunded and there has to be a break in the service of the program. Ms. Gonzales stated that the Restorative Justice Program gets the funding however it is always months late.

Mr. DeMella explained the programs that are funded over \$50,000 have to go through the proper channels at the City Finance Department then to the City Council and finally to the Mayor. Mr. DeMella explained other money can be moved around in the same category but not a new one and not a program that is already budgeted over \$50,000.

A discussion was held about holding a Program Committee meeting to discuss and decide which program to place that overage in.

A brief discussion was held about possibly using it for tutoring.

The Fire Alarm disturbed the meeting from 5:19 p.m. until 5:24 p.m.

A discussion was held and a decision was made to have the Program Committee meet next week to insure it gets used placed and used by the end of June.

B.) Approval of Financial Report

Mr. Trujillo moved to approve the Financial Report as presented with a second from Ms. Pathak which passed by voice vote.

7. PRESENTATIONS:

A.) Communities in Schools-Julia Bergen

Ms. Bergen presented the Board with a flyer and a brochure on Communities in schools. (See Exhibit C). Ms. Bergen described the goals and the work they do with the program. The site coordinators work with the administrators and the students within the schools. They have offices in the schools so that they are accessible to the students.

Ms. Bergen described the work done at Cesar Chavez Elementary and the change in their school grade. The site coordinators have the summers off, however if the school has a summer program and needs the program they work with them.

Ms. Perez-Vargas spoke about the work she has done at the school. A student explained and described the tutoring and overall care that Ms. Perez-Vargas gave her and other students. Although the student moved to middle school she still helps tutor the student along with Ms. Perez-Vargas a few days a week.

Ms. Morales is a parent of a special needs student that Ms. Perez-Vargas helps in school. She explained the great things Ms. Perez-Vargas is teaching him, he is not able to retain a lot of information but he is learning simple things. Ms. Perez-Vargas has done such great work with her son, she has helped her as a parent as well.

Nurse Seymore described Ms. Perez-Vargas as indispensable. She explained the changes at the school since the program started. She explained with the school's grade change there came a loss funding. Nurse Seymore discussed the population of students who were not vaccinated became vaccinated with the help of Ms. Perez-Vargas.

Nurse Seymore explained how Ms. Perez-Vargas helps many needy families secure basic needs.

Vice Chair Dickson thanked them all for their work.

B.) Job Corps-Glenda Sanchez, Admissions Coordinator

Ms. Sanchez, an admission councilor for Job Corps introduced herself and presented a handout and brochure. (See Exhibit D) There are two campuses in the state, there is one is Roswell and one in Albuquerque.

Ms. Sanchez explained they service 16-24 year olds, they must be drug free. They help these young adults to get their GED or Diploma. The young adults can earn a stipend.

Ms. Sanchez explained that the enrolled will work with a counselor for two years. They will live on campus and are fed and given medical and dental care.

Ms. Sanchez is in the Northern part of the state recruiting because it is needed in this area.

A brief discussion was held about those that are currently on probation. Ms. Sanchez stated it depends on the severity of the probation. Perhaps the program can work with the JPS rather than sending the youth to a detention facility.

A brief discussion was held about the success rate they have. Mr. DeMella stated he visited the site and was very impressed with it. The youth is very receptive and it is a safe place for them.

8. MATTERS FROM THE BOARD

A.) New Programs FY 16/17-Programs Committee

It was decided to table this until the Program Committee meets next week.

B.) County Letter-Sam Jackson

Mr. DeMella distributed a draft of a short letter addressed to the County of Santa Fe regarding the Day Reporting Program. (See Exhibit E)

Vice Chair Dickson explained the reason for the letter. He excused the presenters and thanked them for their time.

A discussion was held about the amount that the County will be paid for Salaries and Benefits. The amount will be the half of the match that is written in the MOU (\$32,583). It was decided to explain in more detail in the letter why that amount is being paid, the MOU was not approved and in place for the entire time agreed upon.

It was decided the letter will address these concerns. A draft will be sent via email and sent out.

C.) Discussion of ICM contract

This item was discussed earlier.

CIS has worked at Cesar Chavez since 2013 with Hilda Perez-Vargas as CIS Site Coordinator. She worked two years prior to CIS under the direction of the Santa Fe County Juvenile Justice Board. During her time with CIS, Hilda has built a strong presence and support system for children and families ensuring that broad school-wide needs are met while individual student and family needs are addressed and mitigated in a timely, thoughtful and efficient manner.

"I am incredibly blessed to be working with the families at Cesar Chavez Elementary, and I am vested in being the guide who helps our village to raise our children. Our families drive my work and together we are moving towards a better tomorrow." Hilda Perez-Vargas, CIS Site Coordinator

Highlights/Focus:

- Hilda is currently **Case Managing 96 students—which is 21%** of the student body at Cesar Chavez. Hilda works with case managed students individually and in small goal-focused groups.
- Weekly meetings with the wellness team to establish and clarify roles and ensure students in need of support and case managing are supported. Develop and implement individual student intervention/prevention plans. Track student/family progress.
- Organizes and supports ongoing parent events to engage parents and families so that students are surrounded with a network of support including: parent coffees at school; arts and crafts with families for school events, Fall Festival, *Cars* drive-in movie night, UNM tour, yard sales to raise funds for Cultural events, End of year Event, meetings with Dr. Boyd, and computer, GED and Citizenship classes for parents.
- Organize and support multiple programs for academic after and during school tutoring including: Capital High School tutors and Desert Academy tutors,
- Organize and facilitate multiple programs to serve high-need children including: multiple basic needs supports and supplies for students: clothing and school supply closets, coat drives, maintaining a food pantry and **snack pack distribution for 150 students weekly**, Cooking with Kids, Girls Inc. groups and Gerard's House groups.
