

24	WHEREAS, the number of Double Up Food Bucks retail outlets across the state has increased		
25	from 34 in 2015 to nearly 90 in 2016; and,

2	WHEREAS, nearly 19,000 customers and approximately 800 farmers are participating in the	
3	Double Up Food Bucks program across the state; and	
4	WHEREAS, in Santa Fe County during 2016 EBT card and Double Up Food Bucks sales for	
5	New Mexico-grown food have increased to nearly \$207,000 (up 44%) since 2015; and	
6	WHEREAS, across the state during 2016 EBT card and Double Up Food Bucks sales for New	
7	Mexico-grown food have increased to more than \$722,000 (up 86%) since 2015; and	
8	WHEREAS, in 2014, at the Santa Farmer's Market alone, there were 2,444 of	
9	EBT transactions made that amounted to \$45,100 in total DUFB sales, and in 2015 it increased to 3,858	
10	transactions with \$88,635 of sales, and 2016 has continued to increase with 4,096 EBT transactions	
11	completed that amounted to \$112,343 in total EBT sales, and \$112,145 provided an additional DUFB,

13	WHEREAS, DUFB tokens may only be used for locally grown produce, and 98 vendors at the	
14	Santa Fe Farmer's Market participated in DUFB program in order to provide more fresh fruits and

Lindell 9 10 **A RESOLUTION** 11 IN SUPPORT OF THE 'NEW MEXICO GROWN FRESH FRUITS AND FRESH 12 VEGETABLES FOR SCHOOL MEALS PROGRAM' STATE LEGISLATION. 13 14 WHEREAS, thirty percent (30.3%) of kindergarteners and almost thirty-nine percent 15 (38.9 %) of third graders in New Mexico are considered overweight or obese; and 16 WHEREAS, 339,613 children participate in the school lunch program operated by the 17 various school meals programs throughout New Mexico, of which more than 212,000 are eligible 18 to participate in the free or reduced-price school meal programs; and 19 WHEREAS, more than 15,600 students in the city and County of Santa Fe participate in 20 the school meal program; and 21 WHEREAS, the National School Lunch Program (NSLP – Federal Program) makes it 22 possible for all school children in the United States to receive a nutritious lunch every school day; 23 and 24 WHEREAS, local school meal programs will see increased costs for food purchases of 25 an average of \$.25 to \$.75 per plate with a minimal Federal increase of \$.06 reimbursement per

meal; and

WHEREAS, the National School Lunch Program provides a reimbursement of \$2.86 for free lunches and \$2.46 for reduced-priced lunches; and,

WHEREAS, the purchase of New Mexico fruits and vegetables will enhance the diet of these school children and help school meal programs comply with new Federal rules that now require additional servings of fruits and vegetables on the children's school meal plates; and,

WHEREAS, there is an emerging agricultural sector in NM—small and medium-size fruit and vegetable farmers—who can respond to this new food "market" for local produce in the school meal programs; and

WHEREAS, increased funding from the state legislature enables school meal programs and local school districts to purchase New Mexico grown produce, serve more fresh fruit and vegetables to our children for their health and well-being, and support economic development and opportunities for our local farmers; and

WHEREAS, increased funding would assist our schools and farmers in Santa Fe City and County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE that they join the New Mexico Food and Agriculture Policy Council, the New Mexico School Nutrition Association, the Santa Fe City and County Advisory Council on Food Policy, and other organizations in requesting that the New Mexico State Legislature appropriate \$1.44 million to support the "New Mexico Grown Fresh Fruits and Fresh Vegetables for School Meals" program.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Clerk is directed to forward a copy of this resolution to the City's State legislative delegation, and the City's lobbyist.

Rivera 10 A RESOLUTION 11 CALLING ON THE NEW MEXICO STATE LEGISLATURE TO AMEND CHAPTER 12 29-1-14(H) NMSA 1978 TO REQUIRE THE DESTRUCTION BY ALL NEW MEXICO 13 LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES OF ALL FIREARMS IN THEIR POSSESSION 14 THAT ARE NO LONGER NECESSARY FOR USE IN OBTAINING A CONVICTION, 15 OR ARE NOT NEEDED FOR ANY OTHER PUBLIC PURPOSE. 16 17 WHEREAS, the City of Santa Fe disposed of 600 seized firearms in 2014 by bulldozing 18 and burying them at the Santa Fe landfill; and 19 WHEREAS, the City of Santa Fe collected 174 firearms in 2015; and 20 WHEREAS, as a result of Resolution 2016-83, with support of the Santa Fe Police 21 Department, the Guns to Gardens project sponsored by New Mexicans to Prevent Gun Violence 22 hosted a recent gun buyback to repurpose guns into garden tools; and 23 WHEREAS, current Santa Fe Police Department policy allows for the "destruction or 24 disposal of... firearms in accordance with applicable laws"; and 25 WHEREAS, in 2014, the City of Albuquerque confiscated 1,644 firearms during

criminal investigations; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 29-1-14(H) NMSA 1978 states that "[o]nce it is determined by the law enforcement agency that any property enumerated in this subsection is no longer necessary for use in obtaining a conviction or is not needed for any other public purpose, the law enforcement agency may apply to the district court...for an order authorizing destruction or other disposition of the property..."; and

WHEREAS, it is the current policy of the Santa Fe Police Department to destroy all unclaimed and seized weapons in the possession of the Police Department; and

WHEREAS, the Santa Fe Police Department sponsored a gun buyback program in 2013 that brought in over 400 firearms, all of which were subsequently destroyed, taking many weapons off of our streets; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Governing Body to ensure that the Santa Fe Police Department destroys all firearms in its possession, when legally permissible, to ensure they do not return to our streets.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE that the New Mexico Legislature is requested to amend Chapter 29-1-14(H) NMSA 1978 to require that all firearms in the possession of New Mexico law enforcement agencies, which are no longer necessary for use in obtaining a conviction, or are not needed for any other public purpose, shall be destroyed.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this request shall in no way conflict or contradict the provisions of the Second Amendment to the United States Constitution regarding the right to bear arms, or any other national, state or local law regulating that right.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Clerk is directed to forward a copy of this resolution to the City of Santa Fe lobbyist and the City of Santa Fe State Legislative Delegation.

A RESOLUTION

IN SUPPORT OF SENATE BILL 360 REGARDING COMPETITIVE RESOURCE PROCUREMENT FOR ELECTRIC UTILITIES IN THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO.

WHEREAS, the Governing Body has reviewed Senate Bill (SB) 360, recently introduced by State Senator Joseph Cervantes at the 53rd Session of the New Mexico Legislature and now being considered by Legislature, that would require investor-owned electric public utilities to provide the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission (PRC) with the results of a competitive resource procurement (RFP) process when applying to the PRC for approval of their procurement of a new "supply-side electric energy or capacity resource" for a duration greater than one year;

WHEREAS, SB 360 would also require that the PRC approve a qualified "independent evaluator" to advise the PRC regarding the sufficiency and reasonableness of those utility RFP processes and a utility's bid evaluation procedures and methods;

WHEREAS, the City of Santa Fe, residents and businesses residing in the City are retail service customers of Public Service Company of New Mexico (PNM), an investor-owned electric

utility, and thus their rates for retail electric service and the impacts of those rates on their budgets and business operations are affected by the cost of new supply-side electric energy or capacity resources procured by an investor-owned electric utility for a duration greater than one year;

WHEREAS, the Governing Body is informed that a 2008 study commissioned by the National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners and the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission stated: "Competitive procurements can provide utilities with a way of obtaining electricity supply that has the 'best' fit to customers' needs at the 'best' possible terms. In principle, competitive procurements accomplish this goal by requiring market participants to compete for the opportunity to provide these services";

WHEREAS, state law provides that whenever an electric public utility applies to the PRC for approval of a certificate of public convenience and necessity (CCN) for a new supply-side resource pursuant to NMSA 1978, § 62-9-1.A, the utility applicant has the burden of proving to the PRC that the new supply-side resource proposed is its most cost-effective resource option among all feasible alternatives to meet its service needs;

WHEREAS, the Governing Body agrees with the foregoing statement in the 2008 study commissioned by NARUC and the FERC that requests for competitive proposals by electric public utilities is an important and valuable method for such utilities to reasonably identify all feasible supply-side resource options available to them at a particular time to meet their service needs in accordance with the "most cost-effective resource portfolio" criteria set forth in the EUEA, NMSA 1978, § 62-17-10, and in the PRC's IRP Rule, § 17.7.3, et seq., NMAC;

WHEREAS, the Governing Body in its own procurement processes engages in Request for Proposal (RFP) processes which ensure a competitive bidding process designed to deliver to the people of Santa Fe the best and most cost prudent procurements;

WHEREAS, requiring investor-owned electric public utilities in New Mexico to conduct RFP processes, similar to those engaged in by governmental entities delivering service to their

constituencies, to support their applications to the PRC for approval of new supply-side resources is prudent and reasonable and in the best interest of the citizens of Santa Fe;

WHEREAS, requiring the PRC to implement an independent evaluator advisory process as set forth in SB 360 to ensure those processes are reasonable and conducted fairly will protect and benefit customers of those utilities and the public interest by encouraging more independent power producers to participate in such utility competitive processes and thereby provide greater competition, consistent with the "most cost-effective resource portfolio" criteria set forth in the EUEA, NMSA 1978, § 62-17-10, and in the PRC's IRP Rule;

WHEREAS, on May 29, 2014, Southwest Generation Operating Co., LLC, an independent power producer, the Office of the Attorney General of New Mexico, New Energy Economy, the Interwest Energy Alliance and the New Mexico Green Chamber of Commerce filed a Joint Petition with the PRC asking that the PRC establish an independent evaluator process, similar to the independent evaluator or monitor processes adopted in other states, to advise the PRC regarding the reasonableness of the scope of future RFPs and the bidding evaluation processes conducted by PNM to support its future applications with the PRC for approval of new supply-side resource proposals to replace capacity of Units 2 and 3 of the San Juan Generating Station proposed for retirement at the end of 2017 in Case No. 13-00390-UT that was opposed by PNM and the PRC's Utility Division Staff;;

WHEREAS, the PRC has not taken any action on that Joint Petition to date;

WHEREAS, in PRC Case Nos. 14-00152-UT, 13-00390-UT, 15-00205-UT and 16-00105-UT, PNM argued that, absent express statutory authority to do so, the PRC lacks authority to require an investor-owned electric public utility like PNM to conduct an RFP process and present its results to the PRC to support its application to the PRC for approval of a new supply-side resource;

WHEREAS, based on its review of SB 360, it is the understanding of the Governing

1	Body that subsection I of that Bill sets forth a reasonable provision allowing an investor-owned	
2	electric public utility to request a waiver of the application of the requirements in that Bill upon a	
3	showing of "extraordinary circumstances" and that such a waiver is necessary to protect the	
4	public interest.	
5	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Governing Body strongly supports	
6	the Legislature's passage and the Governor's enactment of SB 360 to promote greater and fair	
7	competition with respect to the procurement of supply-side resources by investor-owned electric

CALLING ON THE NEW MEXICO LEGISLATURE TO REDUCE GUN VIOLENCE BY ENACTING LEGISLATION REQUIRING COMPREHENSIVE BACKGROUND CHECKS FOR FIREARM SALES AND STRENGTHENING THE CRIMINAL BACKGROUND CHECK SYSTEM.

WHEREAS, an average of 91 Americans are killed with guns every day. Our community and nation have been repeatedly devastated by mass shootings and the daily toll of gun violence that claims more than 30,000 lives each year; and

WHEREAS, in the last decade, 798 New Mexico residents were murdered with guns, a rate more than 50% higher than the national average; and

WHEREAS, in the last decade, 2,020 New Mexico residents committed suicide with a firearm, a rate almost double the national average; and

WHEREAS, the City Council supports common-sense policies that promote public safety in Santa Fe and keep guns out of dangerous hands while respecting the Second Amendment rights of law-abiding gun owners; and

WHEREAS, under federal law convicted felons, the seriously mentally ill, domestic violence abusers, and other dangerous people are prohibited from possessing guns, and licensed gun dealers are required to conduct background checks on would-be buyers to enforce these prohibitions; and

WHEREAS, background checks have blocked more than 2.4 million gun sales to criminals and other prohibited purchasers since the federal criminal background check system took effect in 1998; and

WHEREAS, in New Mexico alone in the last three years for which data is available, the background check system has blocked 5,739 gun sales to prohibited people, including 2,360 felons, 1,661 fugitives, and 962 to people convicted of domestic violence misdemeanors or subject to domestic violence protection orders; and

WHEREAS, a dangerous loophole in the federal background check law undermines public safety by allowing unlicensed, private sellers to sell guns to strangers without background checks and with no questions asked; and

WHEREAS, unlicensed sellers sell millions of guns without background checks every year in the United States at gun shows, online, through classified advertisementsor by other means; and

WHEREAS, too many of the 30,000 lives lost each year to gun deaths are caused by individuals who are barred from purchasing or possessing guns under federal law but who manage to obtain guns without passing background checks; and

WHEREAS, over the last decade, New Mexico had the highest national statewide rate of law enforcement officers killed with a handgun that was not their own – a rate over 300% higher than the national average; and

WHEREAS, in states that require background checks for all handgun sales, 46% fewer women are shot to death by intimate partners, 48% fewer law enforcement are shot to



WHEREAS, in spite of the purpose of the statute, the Office of the State Engineer (OSE) has argued that § 72-1-9, the forty year planning statute, can be used to show that a municipality has abandoned a water right;

WHEREAS, municipalities, counties, and other entities encompassed by the statute may need even longer planning periods, but in no event should these entities lose their water rights except through statutory forfeiture or judicial abandonment processes;

WHEREAS, in the 2015 Regular Session of the Legislature, Senator Griggs introduced Senate Bill 665;

WHEREAS, SB 665 proposed to amend NMSA 1978, § 72-1-9 to state that a water right acquired and held unused pursuant to the provisions of this section shall not be automatically lost

1	after forty years, except by statutory forfeiture or judicial proceedings to prove abandonment.
2	WHEREAS, in Resolution 2015-26, the City of Santa Fe supported the legislature's
3	effort to protect municipalities' investment in water rights acquired for future growth; and
4	WHEREAS, the City continues to support legislation, which will protect a

WHEREAS, under the present practice, the OSE can approve these applications and the applicant can use the water prior to public notice, an opportunity to protest, and a hearing;

CONCERNING AN OFFENDER'S POSSESSION OF FIREARMS WHILE SUBJECT TO AN ORDER OF PROTECTION OR FOLLOWING CONVICTION FOR A DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OFFENSE

Whereas, the Violence Policy Center ranked New Mexico as the third most dangerous state for women in 2013, the year in which twenty-one women were killed by their intimate partners, fourteen of which were committed with a firearm; and

Whereas, a woman is five times more likely to be killed by a domestic violence offender if the offender owns a gun; and

Whereas, a firearm was used in 64% of reviewed CY2012 homicides and 86% of reviewed suicides; and

Whereas, six reviewed CY2012 cases involved a prohibited person in possession of a firearm and three had convictions for misdemeanor domestic violence and all six had at least one felony conviction; and

Whereas, all 13 judicial district courts combined issued 3,523 domestic violence orders of protection during calendar year 2013 and the following year 3,512 orders were issued; and

Whereas, a law is needed that will reduce the threat women and children experience from domestic violence offenders; and

Whereas, New Mexico Intimate Partner Violence Death Review Team has urged for the creation and passage of such state legislation actively supported by New Mexicans to Prevent Gun Violence, Coalition to Stop Gun Violence, The Office of the Attorney General, District Attorney Jennifer Padgett and domestic violence awareness groups throughout the State of New Mexico; and

Whereas, twenty-eight states have enacted similar legislation that prohibits possession of, or sales to, any person subject to an order of protection under the Family Violence Protection Act; and

Whereas, such bill, called "Relating to Domestic Violence; Prohibiting Individuals Subject to Orders of Protection from Possessing or Purchasing Firearms," has been prepared by the New Mexico Legislative Council Services that mirrors Federal statue; and

Whereas, this legislation will aid law enforcement in keeping the peace in volatile domestic relationships, reinforce the importance of removing firearms from the hands of domestic violence offenders, may provide resources for retrieving and storing these weapons and create a comprehensive system for monitoring compliance.

Now, Therefore, Be it Resolved that the New Mexico Municipal League supports legislation relating to Domestic Violence; "Prohibiting Individuals Subject to Orders of Protection from Possessing or Purchasing Firearms."

CONCERNING STATE GRANTS FOR LIBRARIES

Whereas, New Mexico public libraries provide books and other materials to meet the informational, educational, cultural and recreational needs of all New Mexicans; and

Whereas, the effectiveness of a library is determined by its ability to deliver current, accurate information in a timely manner through books and materials answering community needs; and

Whereas, advances in technology have made information resources increasingly accessible electronically; and

Whereas, the demand for library resources continues to rise while the cost of providing the resources is beyond local funding capacity; and

Whereas, publicly funded libraries have increased their effectiveness by sharing their resources electronically, enabling public, school and college libraries to coordinate the use of scarce library funds within the community and statewide; and

Whereas, a proposal will be presented to the 2017 New Mexico Legislature to increase the appropriation from the general fund to the library division of the cultural affairs department to provide grants-in-aid for local library services and operations; and

Whereas, public libraries have experienced a substantial growth in usage, yet many municipalities lack resources to support adequate funding for library collections and operating expenditures.

Whereas, the current state grants-in-aid distribution is \$.37 per capita; and

Whereas, state grants-in-aid for other similarly sized states averages \$1.67; and

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved That the New Mexico Municipal League endorses the passage of legislation to increase the appropriation to the library division of the cultural affairs to provide grants-in-aid for local library services and operations.
