#### Entity Planning: Process, Nature/Effect/Options/Recommendations of Trends

The City of Santa Fe through its Division of Senior Services provides a comprehensive array of programs to serve its elderly population. Our mission and programs are designed to help older adults to age in place in their homes and communities as health and function decline, thereby preserving their independence and dignity and deferring unnecessary and costly institutionalization for as long as possible. In this larger context, we provide services that are essential part of a continuum of care system such as door-to-door transportation, nutrition (congregate and home-delivered meals), in-home support (homemaker and respite care), preventive healthcare, volunteer opportunities, advocacy, outreach and activities/recreation for the elderly. In offering these services, the City's contribution is supplemented by grants from Federal and State agencies. By leveraging these funding sources, taxpayers receive the biggest bang for their buck. Our main goal is to continue to preserve and enhance existing programs by obtaining sufficient funding to cover operating and maintenance costs to include adequate staffing levels and necessary supplies to effectively provide quality services. For fiscal year 2017/2018 2,525 senior citizens have consistently used almost on a daily basis Senior Services programs such as congregate meals, home-delivered meals, transportation, and in-home support services. Our accomplishments include: 61,834 hot meals served at five congregate meal sites and 108,263 home-delivered meals provided to frail, homebound Seniors; 32,403 rides to medical appointments, grocery shopping, meals, social services and other social activities and functions; 17,000 hours of in-home service and respite care provided to clients with Alzheimer's and Dementia, etc.

The Division of Senior Services prioritizes their projects and programs by conducting a public hearing at the beginning of each year. In addition, in compliance with Non-Metro Area Agency on Aging funding requirement, each program (i.e. In-home Support Services, Nutrition and Transportation) conduct a Quality Survey annually to ensure that consumers are engaged in the development of services that will assist them. Moreover, our 11-member Advisory Council assists in identifying, prioritizing and enhancing our senior programs. All these sources, along with an open-door policy for all seniors, provide a quality programming and services that meet the needs and wants of our senior population. The City of Santa Fe Senior Services Division endeavors to provide the needed services and fully utilize all of the limited resources available.

- 1. Ensure the safety of the City of Santa Fe's senior citizens by complying with all applicable Federal, State and local health and environmental regulations and codes.
- 2. Ensure that all facilities and infrastructure are adequately provided and maintained to meet the needs and demands of a growing elderly population in the City of Santa Fe.
- 3. Ensure that our services and facilities are as accessible as possible and ADA compliant so seniors can stay living in their own homes as long as possible.

#### Factors/Trends Considered

People are living longer today than ever before. By the year 2030, one-fifth of the US population is expected to be 65 years of age and older. The census also forecasts that by 2030, older adults from the 'baby boom' generation will account for 20% of the nation's population, up from 13% in 2001. The City of Santa Fe's senior population growth rate has mirrored the United States. In 2010, only the downtown area had a majority population aged 65 and over, but by 2020 it is projected that the entire eastern portion of the city will be a majority of those aged 65 and over. And by the year 2020, the senior population in Santa Fe will be larger than the youth population (ages 0-19), perhaps for the first time in Santa Fe's history. The senior population is projected to grow to 25% of the city's total population, 30% by 2030 (10% higher than the US forecast) and 33% by 2040. This forecast does not include thousands of Baby Boomers living in Santa Fe as second homeowners as Census only counts permanent residents. This fast growing population of older adults in today's society brings many issues and challenges. In the 2013 National Health & Aging Trend Study, 67% of seniors need help doing one or more daily activities while up to 75% of older adults have multiple (2 or more) chronic conditions. In addition, poverty is prevalent among senior citizens. In the City of Santa Fe, based on the 2015 US Census, 9% of seniors (1% higher than the national figure) were living below the poverty threshold and relying solely on Social Security retirement income. This condition may be attributed to higher percentage of Hispanics and female residing in Santa Fe. Nevertheless, many low-income seniors, while above the national poverty line, struggle daily for funds to cover their costs for food, housing, healthcare and transportation. These are the segment of senior population living in the City of Santa Fe that the Division of Senior Services aims to serve under the Older Americans Act.
