| 11 | IN SUPPORT OF ESTABLISHING A UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF PEACE AND                                  |
| 12 | NONVIOLENCE AND A NEW MEXICO OFFICE OF PEACE.   |

| 14 | WHEREAS, during the course of the 20th century, more than 100,000,000 people perished               |
| 15 | in wars, and now, at the dawn of the 21st century, violence seems to be an overarching theme in our |
| 16 | communities and world; and  |
| 17 | WHEREAS, it is recognized that the cost of violence prevention is significantly less than the       |
| 18 | cost of recovering from any one act of violence in a community; and                                 |
| 19 | WHEREAS, promoting a culture of peace has been recognized by the United Nations                     |
| 20 | Education, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) with a resolution declaring an             |
| 21 | International Decade for a Culture of Peace and Nonviolence for the Children of the World, 2001-    |
| 22 | 2010; and   |
| 23 | WHEREAS, House Resolution 808 to establish a United States Department of Peace and                  |
| 24 | Nonviolence is currently pending before the 2009-2010 U.S. House of Representatives with 71 co-     |
| 25 | sponsors in the House; and  |

WHEREAS, the proposed federal legislation to create a Department of Peace and

Nonviolence will establish a cabinet-level Department of Peace, which will be headed by a Secretary

of Peace who will advise the President on issues that are both domestic and international in scope,

augmenting our current problem-solving options, providing practical, nonviolent solutions to the

problems of domestic and international conflict; and

WHEREAS, the United States Department of Peace will consist of seven (7) offices

whereas, the United States Department of Peace will consist of seven (7) offices including an Office of Peace Education and Training; an Office of International Peace Activities; an Office of Technology for Peace; an Office of Arms Control and Disarmament; an Office of Peaceful Coexistence and Nonviolent Conflict Resolution; an Office of Human Rights and Economic Rights; and an Office of Domestic Peace Activities (whose responsibilities are: (1) to develop policies that increase awareness about intervention and counseling on domestic violence and conflict; (2) to develop policy alternatives for the treatment of drug and alcohol abuse; (3) to develop new policies and build on existing programs responsive to the prevention of crime, including the development of community policing strategies and peaceful settlement skills among police and other public safety officers; and (4) to develop community-based strategies for celebrating diversity and promoting tolerance); and

WHEREAS, the proposed federal legislation to create a United States Department of Peace and Nonviolence will benefit the City of Santa Fe by holding peace as an organizing principle at all levels of our society, which will change the tone of our society to greater respect and less violence; and

WHEREAS, the proposed federal legislation to create a United States Department of Peace and Nonviolence will benefit the City of Santa Fe by supporting existing programs and developing new programs from within the community to address and reduce the number and frequency of incidents related to domestic violence, child and spousal abuse, school violence, gang violence, gun violence, violence resulting from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder, hate crimes and police-community

relations which will assist members of our police department in experiencing fewer dangerous encounters, especially while making routine runs, and strengthen our community; and

WHEREAS, some eighty national and international human rights, peace and environmental organizations and noted individuals, such as the late Walter Cronkite, have endorsed the legislation to establish a United States Department of Peace and Nonviolence, as well as 41 local governing bodies, including Silver City, New Mexico; Albuquerque, New Mexico; Grant County, New Mexico; Las Cruces, New Mexico; Chicago, Illinois; Cleveland, Ohio; Corvallis, Oregon; Lansing, Miami; Los Angeles, California; Santa Cruz, California; Minneapolis, Minnesota; Newark, New Jersey and Providence, Rhode Island; and

WHEREAS, the New Mexico Office of Peace legislation was inspired by, and will collaborate with, the proposed United States Department of Peace and Nonviolence establishing an office at the state level dedicated to peacemaking, social justice and human rights; training that will enable the prevention, management and resolution of conflict without violence, including the practice of Restorative Justice which is beginning to make the Santa Fe Public Schools safer, a facilitated process that provides the space and time for everyone involved in a conflict to speak and listen sincerely and respectfully, to tell their stories and take responsibility for any harm caused seeking ways to make things right as much as possible acting to restore relationships and community; and the study and implementation of appropriate educational curricula at all levels and of conditions that are conducive to a culture of peace; and

WHEREAS, many statewide organizations have endorsed the New Mexico Office of Peace legislation, such as the New Mexico Coalition Against Domestic Violence, New Mexico Conference of Churches, New Mexico Mediation Association, New Mexico Catholic Conference of Bishops, NAACP New Mexico Conference of Branches, NAACP Santa Fe Branch, Somos Un Pueblo Unido, Tewa Women United, Veterans for Peace (Santa Fe, Taos, Albuquerque), Albuquerque Center for Peace and Justice and many peace and justice organizations throughout New Mexico; and

WHEREAS, the City of Santa Fe has participated in Cities for Peace, the Mayors for Peace Initiative, several International Sister Cities Programs that promote understanding and citizen diplomacy, and has proclaimed Mother's Day as Peace Day in Santa Fe.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE that the governing body supports the enactment of United States House Resolution 808 to create a United States Department of Peace and Nonviolence and supports the adoption of state legislation to create a New Mexico Office of Peace.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution shall be sent to United States Representative Ben Ray Lujan and President Barack Obama and that the governing body urges Representative Lujan to co-sponsor HR 808 in the United States House to create a United States Department of Peace and Nonviolence and that Representative Lujan and President Obama actively support its passage.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to United States
Senator Jeff Bingaman and United States Senator Tom Udall and that the governing body urges
Senator Udall and Senator Bingaman to introduce a companion bill to HR 808 in the United States
Senate to create a United States Department of Peace and Nonviolence and to actively support its
passage.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to Santa Fe's state legislative delegation and Governor Bill Richardson and that the governing body urges the state legislators and Governor Richardson to actively support the passage of the New Mexico Office of Peace legislation.
