

## **Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) 2022-2023 Funded Projects**

**Organization:** Interfaith Shelter

**Project/Activity:** Women's Summer Safe Haven at Pete's Place

**Funded Amount:** \$35,000

**Description:** Provide safe, hospitable shelter and food services to chronically homeless women (and their children) during summer months when the shelter is otherwise not open, estimated to serve 160 people. The WSSH will also provide a point of entry to the other services necessary to make the transition from homelessness to stable housing.

**Organization:** Bella Luz, LLLP

**Project/Activity:** Lamplighter Inn Hotel Conversion Project

**Funded Amount:** \$295,094

**Description:** Rehabilitate and convert the Lamplighter Inn on Cerrillos Road into 58 units of affordable housing for low-moderate income residents at 80% AMI or less. CDBG funds will support rehabilitation construction costs, such as lead and asbestos remediation.

**Organization:** New Mexico Coalition to End Homelessness

**Project/Activity:** Consuelo's Place Shelter

**Funded Amount:** \$353,162

**Description:** Provide emergency shelter and services for those experiencing homelessness and for those at imminent risk of becoming homeless. Consuelo's Place Shelter also provides quarantine services and housing for those who have recently tested positive for COVID-19, have had recent exposure to COVID-19, and/or are awaiting results. Funds from this request will support emergency shelter stays, case management, formal and informal skill building for clients, quarantine services, general upkeep, security services, and staff salaries and administration.

**Organization:** Santa Fe Habitat for Humanity

**Project/Activity:** Home Repair Assistance Program

**Funded Amount:** \$100,000

**Description:** Funding will support the repair of 12-15 homes for residents at or below 80% of Area Median Income (AMI). Previously, 90%+ of Habitat Home Repair clients have been elderly or single women whose only income is Social Security. Along with making inhabitable residences safe and comfortable, the benefit of the assistance often allows many to remain safely in their homes and to protect the value of their equity. The maximum repair is capped at \$14,000.

**Organization:** Santa Fe Public Schools - Adelante

**Project/Activity:** School Liaison Program

**Funded Amount:** \$35,000

**Description:** The liaison project links SFPS's most vulnerable students and their families – those experiencing homelessness – to housing resources and other critical support services. The program's objective is to empower students to be academically successful by alleviating the stress caused by homelessness through culturally competent case management. The liaison position works closely with case managers and school personal to connect families with housing and other public benefits, also including: food, clothing, school supplies, and transportation. The requested funds will partially support two liaison positions and the program expects to serve 1,000 children and families.

**Organization:** Youth Shelters and Family Services

**Project/Activity:** Transitional Living and Street Outreach Programs

**Funded Amount:** \$20,000

**Description:** The Transitional Living Program provides a supervised independent living campus at 4435 Airport Road for young people aged 17-22. The Street Outreach Program operates a drop-in center at 1570 Pacheco Street and provides homeless young people up to age 21 with necessities for survival as well as referrals and services which seek to end their homelessness. CDBG funds requested will be used for salaries associated with both programs.
