Request for the Approval of Professional Services Agreement in the Total Amount of \$100,000.00 for Horticultural, Maintenance and Educational Services in the Railyard Park through June 30th, 2020; Railyard Park Conservancy; Sam Burnett, jsburnett@santafenm.gov, (505) 795-2491.

BACKGROUND:

In May 2017 the City of Santa Fe issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) to implement and manage the Santa Fe Railyard Park Programs, in order to determine what entities/agencies would be interested in implementing the Railyard Park Programs.

The Railyard Park Conservancy in coordination with the Santa Fe Conservation Trust (SFCT) submitted the only response to the RFP. The SFCT is the Railyard Conservation Easement grantee for the City of Santa Fe. The RFP Evaluation Committee selected the Railyard Park Conservancy to continue administering the Railyard Park Programs.

Established in 2008, the Santa Fe Railyard Park Conservancy previously known as the "Railyard Park Stewards" is a non-profit organization, whose mission is to provide community stewardship and advocacy for the care and programming of the Railyard Park.

Consistently, on a yearly basis the Railyard Park Conservancy provides approximately 4000 hours in specialized horticultural care, community garden coordination, public outreach and volunteer coordination, fundraising and programming for specialized park events.

Resolutions 2010-11 and 2010-82 were approved by City Council supporting the Railyard Park Conservancy programs and partially funding their work towards their mission. In 2010 the City of Santa Fe funded \$25,000 and 2011 \$50,000.

On April 25, 2012 the City Council approved an amended resolution supporting the Railyard Park Conservancy efforts at the Railyard Park by directing staff to enter into a contract with the Railyard Park Conservancy to provide services for the Railyard Park. The Railyard Park Conservancy amended resolution included a \$100,000 per year reimbursement from the city for three fiscal years FY12/13, FY13/14 and FY14/15 towards the ongoing and expanding efforts of the Railyard Park Conservancy. In addition, the Railyard Park Conservancy received \$100,000 for fiscal years FY16/17, and FY17/18. In fiscal year FY18/19 the Conservancy received \$150,000.

SUMMARY:

The Railyard Park Conservancy accomplishments for the fiscal year 19/20 are provided in a detailed report prepared by the Park Conservancy, which is attached to this approval packet. The City's Property Maintenance Manager monitors the progress outlined in their Professional Services Agreements and issues payments based upon these criteria alone.

The Railyard Park Conservancy has submitted a letter requesting the funds for fiscal year 20/21 in the amount \$100,000.

City of Santa Fe Contract Railyard Stage, Sound and Movie Programing

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into by and between the City of Santa Fe, herein after referred to as the "City", and **The Railyard Park Conservancy** herein after referred to as the "Contractor."

IT IS MUTUALLY AGREED BETWEEN THE PARTIES:

1. **Definitions**

- A. "Agreement Administrator" means the individual appointed by the City to administer the Price Agreement.
- B. "Products and Services Schedule" refers to the complete list of products and services offered under this Agreement and the price for each. Product and service descriptions may be amended with the prior approval of the Agreement Administrator. New products and services shall not be added to the Products and Services Schedule.
 - C. "Business Hours" means 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Mountain Time.
- D. "Price Agreement" means a definite quantity contract or indefinite quantity contract which requires the Contractor to furnish items of tangible personal property or service to the procuring agency which issues a purchase order, if the purchase order is within the quantity limitations of the contract, if any.
- E. "You" and "your" refers **The Railyard Park Conservancy** "We," "us" or "our" refers to the City and whose accounts are created under this Agreement.

2. Scope of Work

The Railyard Park Conservancy shall provide horticultural care, educational programming, and public art within the Railyard Park and Plaza. See attached proposal from The Railyard Park Conservancy marked **Exhibit A** attached hereto and made a part thereof.

3. Compensation

The City shall pay the Contractor on a time and materials basis for work outlined in **Exhibit A** as approved by the City of Santa Fe Property Maintenance Manager, or other authorized representative, in an amount that shall not exceed \$100,000.00 plus applicable New Mexico Gross Receipts Tax.

Deliverable item: U/I (unit of issue) Price

01 Horticultural Care, Educational Programming, and Public Art

\$100,000.00

The total compensation under this Agreement shall not exceed \$100,000.00 - including New Mexico gross receipts tax.

4. **Payment Provisions**

All payments under this Agreement are subject to the following provisions.

- A. Acceptance In accordance with Section 13-1-158 NMSA 1978, the City shall determine if the product or services provided meet specifications. Until the products or services have been accepted in writing by the City, the City shall not pay for any products or services. Unless otherwise agreed upon between the City and the Contractor, within thirty (30) days from the date the City receives written notice from the Contractor that payment is requested for services or within thirty (30) days from the receipt of products, the City shall issue a written certification (by letter or email) of complete or partial acceptance or rejection of the products or services. Unless the City gives notice of rejection within the specified time period, the products or services will be deemed to have been accepted.
 - B. Issuance of Orders Only written signed orders are valid under this Price Agreement. A Purchase Order is the approved form for the City issuing Contract Orders under this Price Agreement.
 - C. Payment of Invoice Upon acceptance that the products or services have been received and accepted, payment shall be tendered to the Contractor within thirty (30) days after the date of invoice. After the thirtieth day from the date that written certification of acceptance is issued, late payment charges shall be paid on the unpaid balance due on the contract to the Contractor at the rate of 1.5 % per month. Contractor may submit invoices for payment no more frequently than monthly. Payment will be made to the Contractor's designated mailing address. Payment on each invoice shall be due within 30 days from the date of the acceptance of the invoice. The City agrees to pay in full the balance shown on each account's statement, by the due date shown on said statement.

5. <u>Term</u>

THIS AGREEMENT SHALL NOT BECOME EFFECTIVE UNTIL APPROVED IN WRITING BY THE CITY. This Agreement shall begin on date approved by the City, and end on **6/30/2021**. The City reserves the right to renew the contract on an annual basis by mutual Agreement not exceed a total of four (4) years in accordance with NMSA 1978, §§ 13-1-150 through 152.

6. **Default and Force Majeure**

The City reserves the right to cancel all or any part of any orders placed under this contract without cost to the City, if the Vendor fails to meet the provisions of this contract and, except as otherwise provided herein, to hold the Vendor liable for any excess cost occasioned by the City due to the Vendor's default. The Vendor shall not be liable for any excess costs if failure to perform the order arises out of causes beyond the control and without the fault or negligence of the Vendor; such causes include, but are not restricted to, acts of God or the public enemy, acts of the State or Federal Government, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions, strikes, freight embargoes, unusually severe weather and defaults of sub-contractors due to any of the above, unless the City shall determine that the supplies or services to be furnished by the sub-contractor were obtainable from other sources in sufficient time to permit the Vendor to meet the required delivery scheduled. The rights and remedies of the City provided in this paragraph shall not be exclusive and are in addition to any other rights now being provided by law or under this contract.

7. **Termination**

A. <u>Grounds</u>. The City may terminate this Agreement for convenience or cause. The Contractor may only terminate this Agreement based upon the City's uncured, material breach of this Agreement.

B. Notice; City Opportunity to Cure.

- 1. Except as otherwise provided in Paragraphs 7.A and 17, the City shall give Contractor written notice of termination at least thirty (30) days prior to the intended date of termination.
- 2. Contractor shall give City written notice of termination at least thirty (30) days prior to the intended date of termination, which notice shall (i) identify all the City's material breaches of this Agreement upon which the termination is based and (ii) state what the City must do to cure such material breaches. Contractor's notice of termination shall only be effective (i) if the City does not cure all material breaches within the thirty (30) day notice period or (ii) in the case of material breaches that cannot be cured within thirty (30) days, the City does not, within the thirty (30) day notice period, notify the Contractor of its intent to cure and begin with due diligence to cure the material breach.
- 3. Notwithstanding the foregoing, this Agreement may be terminated immediately upon written notice to the Contractor (i) if the Contractor becomes unable to perform the services contracted for, as determined by the City; (ii) if, during the term of this Agreement, the Contractor is suspended or debarred by the City; or (iii) the Agreement is terminated pursuant to Paragraph 17, "Appropriations", of this Agreement.
- C. <u>Liability.</u> Except as otherwise expressly allowed or provided under this Agreement, the City's sole liability upon termination shall be to pay for acceptable work performed prior to the Contractor's receipt or issuance of a notice of termination; <u>provided, however,</u> that a notice of termination shall not nullify or otherwise affect either party's liability for pre-termination defaults under or breaches of this Agreement. The Contractor shall submit an invoice for such work within thirty (30) days of receiving or sending the notice of termination. <u>THIS PROVISION IS NOT EXCLUSIVE AND DOES NOT WAIVE THE CITY'S OTHER LEGAL RIGHTS AND REMEDIES CAUSED BY THE CONTRACTOR'S DEFAULT/BREACH OF THIS AGREEMENT.</u>

8. **Amendment**

This Price Agreement may be amended by mutual Agreement of the City and the Contractor upon written notice by either party to the other. An amendment to this Price Agreement SHALL NOT AFFECT ANY OUTSTANDING ORDERS issued prior to the effective date of the amendment as mutually agreed upon. Amendments affecting price adjustments and/or extension of contract expiration are not allowed unless specifically provided for in the bid and contract documents.

A. If the City proposes an amendment to the Agreement to unilaterally reduce funding due to budget or other considerations, the Contractor shall, within thirty (30) days of receipt of the proposed Amendment, have the option to terminate the Agreement, pursuant to the termination provisions as set forth in Paragraph 7 herein, or to agree to the reduced funding.

9. Status of Contractor

The Contractor, and Contractor's agents and employees, are independent Contractors for the City and are not employees of the City. The Contractor, and Contractor's agents and employees, shall not accrue leave, retirement, insurance, bonding, use of City vehicles, or any other benefits afforded to employees of the City as a result of this Agreement. The Contractor acknowledges that all sums received hereunder are personally reportable by the Contractor for income tax purposes, including without limitation, self-employment tax and business income tax. The Contractor agrees not to purport to bind the City unless the Contractor has written authority to do so, and then only within the strict limits of that authority.

10. Assignment

A. Neither this price Agreement nor any orders placed under this price Agreement, nor any interest therein, nor claim thereunder, shall be assigned or transferred by the Vendor, except as set forth in subparagraph 10B below or as expressly authorized in writing by the City. No such assignment or transfer shall relieve the Vendor from the obligations and liabilities under this price Agreement.

B. Vendor agrees that any and all claims for overcharge resulting from antitrust violations which are borne by the City as to goods, services, and materials purchased in connection with this bid are hereby assigned to the City.

11. Subcontracting

The Contractor shall not subcontract any portion of any services to be performed under this Agreement without written approval from the City.

12. **Non-Collusion**

In signing this Agreement, the Vendor/Contractor certifies the Vendor/Contractor has not, either directly or indirectly, entered into action in restraint of free competitive bidding in connection with this offer submitted to the City.

13. **Inspection of Plant**

The City may inspect, at any reasonable time during Contractor's regular business hours and upon prior written notice, the Contractor's plant or place of business, or any subcontractor's plant or place of business, which is related to the performance of this contract.

14. **Commercial Warranty**

The Vendor agrees that the tangible personal property or services furnished under this Agreement shall be covered by the most favorable commercial warranties the Vendor gives to any customer for such tangible personal property or services, and that the rights and remedies provided herein shall extend to the City and are in addition to and do not limit any rights afforded to the City by any other clause of this order. Vendor agrees not to disclaim warranties of fitness for a particular purpose or merchantability.

15. Condition of Proposed Items

Where tangible personal property is a part of this Agreement, all proposed items are to be NEW and of most current production, unless otherwise specified.

16. Records and Audit

During the term of this Agreement and for three years thereafter, the Contractor shall maintain detailed records pertaining to the services rendered and products delivered. These records shall be subject to inspection by the City, the State Auditor and other appropriate state and federal authorities. The City shall have the right to audit billings both before and after payment. Payment under this Agreement shall not foreclose the right of the City to recover excessive or illegal payments.

17. **Appropriations**

The terms of this Agreement, and any orders placed under it, are contingent upon sufficient appropriations and authorization being made by the City Council for the performance of this Agreement. If sufficient appropriations and authorization are not made by the legislature, this Agreement, and any orders placed under it, shall terminate upon written notice being given by the City to the Contractor. The City's decision as to whether sufficient appropriations are available shall be accepted by the Contractor and shall be final. If the City proposes an amendment to the Agreement to unilaterally reduce funding, the Contractor shall have the option to terminate the Agreement or to agree to the reduced funding, within thirty (30) days of receipt of the proposed amendment.

18. Release

The Contractor, upon final payment of the amount due under this Agreement, releases the City, its officers and employees, from all liabilities, claims and obligations whatsoever arising from or under this Agreement. The Contractor agrees not to purport to bind the City, unless the Contractor has express written authority to do so, and then only within the strict limits of that authority.

19. **Confidentiality**

Any confidential information provided to or developed by the Contractor in the performance of this Agreement shall be kept confidential and shall not be made available to any individual or organization by the Contractor without prior written approval by the City.

20. **Conflict of Interest**

- A. The Contractor represents and warrants that it presently has no interest and, during the term of this Agreement, shall not acquire any interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance or services required under the Agreement. The Contractor shall comply with any applicable provisions of the New Mexico Governmental Conduct Act and the New Mexico Financial Disclosures Act.
- B. The Contractor further represents and warrants that it has complied with, and, during the term of this Agreement, will continue to comply with, and that this Agreement complies with all applicable provisions of the Governmental Conduct Act, Chapter 10, Article 16 NMSA 1978.
- C. Contractor's representations and warranties in Paragraphs A and B of this Paragraph are material representations of fact upon which the City relied when this Agreement was entered into by the parties. Contractor shall provide immediate written notice to the City if, at any time during the term of this Agreement, Contractor learns that Contractor's representations and warranties in Paragraphs A and B of this Paragraph 20 were erroneous on the effective date of this Agreement or have become erroneous by reason of new or changed circumstances. If it is later determined that Contractor's representations and warranties in Paragraphs A and B of this Paragraph 20 were erroneous on the effective date of this Agreement or have become erroneous by reason of new or changed circumstances, in addition to other remedies available to the City and notwithstanding anything in the Agreement to the contrary, the City may immediately terminate the Agreement.
- D. All terms defined in the Governmental Conduct Act have the same meaning in this section.

21. Approval of Contractor Representative(s)

The City reserves the right to require a change in Contractor representative(s) if the assigned representative(s) are not, in the opinion of the City, adequately serving the needs of the

City.

22. Scope of Agreement; Merger

This Agreement incorporates all the agreements, covenants, and understandings between the parties hereto concerning the subject matter hereof, and all such covenants, agreements and understandings have been merged into this written Agreement. No prior agreements or understandings, verbal or otherwise, of the parties or their agents shall be valid or enforceable unless embodied in this Agreement.

23. Notice

The Procurement Code, Sections 13-1-28 through 13-1-199 NMSA 1978, imposes civil and criminal penalties for its violation. In addition, the New Mexico criminal statutes impose felony penalties for bribes, gratuities and kickbacks.

24. Equal Opportunity Compliance

The Contractor agrees to abide by all federal and state laws, and local Ordinances, pertaining to equal employment opportunity. In accordance with all such laws, rules, and regulations, the Contractor agrees to assure that no person in the United States shall on the grounds of race, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, sex, age, physical or mental handicap, or serious medical condition, spousal affiliation, sexual orientation or gender identity, be excluded from employment with or participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity performed under this Agreement. If Contractor is found not to be in compliance with these requirements during the life of this Agreement, Contractor agrees to take appropriate steps to correct these deficiencies.

25. **Indemnification**

The Contractor shall hold the City and its employees harmless and shall indemnify the City and its employees against any and all claims, suits, actions, liabilities and costs of any kind, including attorney's fees for personal injury or damage to property arising from the acts or omissions of the Contractor, its agents, officers, employees or subcontractors. The Contractor shall not be liable for any injury or damage as a result of any negligent act or omission committed by the City, its officers or employees.

26. New Mexico Tort Claims Act

Any liability incurred by the City of Santa Fe in connection with this Agreement is subject to the immunities and limitations of the New Mexico Tort Claims Act, Section 41-4-1, et. seq. NMSA 1978, as amended. The City and its "public employees" as defined in the New Mexico Tort Claims Act, do not waive sovereign immunity, do not waive any defense and do not waive any limitation of liability pursuant to law. No provision in this Agreement modifies or waives any provision of the New Mexico Tort Claims Act.

27. **Applicable Law**

The laws of the State of New Mexico shall govern this Agreement, without giving effect to its choice of law provisions. Venue shall be proper only in a New Mexico court of competent jurisdiction in accordance with NMSA 1978, § 38-3-1 (G). By execution of this Agreement, Contractor acknowledges and agrees to the jurisdiction of the courts of the State of New Mexico over any and all lawsuits arising under or out of any term of this Agreement.

28. <u>Limitation of Liability</u>

The Contractor's liability to the City, for any cause whatsoever shall be limited to the purchase price paid to the Contractor for the products and services that are the subject of the City's, claim. The foregoing limitation does not apply to paragraph 25 of this Agreement or to damages resulting from personal injury caused by the Contractor's negligence.

29. <u>Incorporation by Reference and Precedence</u>

If this Agreement has been procured pursuant to a request for proposals, this Agreement is derived from (1) the request for proposal, (including any written clarifications to the request for proposals and any City response to questions); (2) the Contractor's best and final offer; and (3) the Contractor's response to the request for proposals.

In the event of a dispute under this Agreement, applicable documents will be referred to for the purpose of clarification or for additional detail in the following order of precedence: (1) amendments to the Agreement in reverse chronological order; (2) the Agreement, including the scope of work and all terms and conditions thereof; (3) the request for proposals, including attachments thereto and written responses to questions and written clarifications; (4) the Contractor's best and final offer if such has been made and accepted by the City; and (5) the Contractor's response to the request for proposals.

30. Workers' Compensation

The Contractor agrees to comply with state laws and rules applicable to workers' compensation benefits for its employees. If the Contractor fails to comply with the Workers' Compensation Act and applicable rules when required to do so, this Agreement may be terminated by the City.

31. **Inspection**

If this contract is for the purchase of tangible personal property (goods), final inspection and acceptance shall be made at Destination. Tangible personal property rejected at Destination for non-conformance to specifications shall be removed at Contractor's risk and expense promptly after notice of rejection and shall not be allowable as billable items for payment.

32. <u>Inspection of Services</u>

If this contract is for the purchase of services, the following terms shall apply.

- A. Services, as used in this Article, include services performed, workmanship, and material furnished or utilized in the performance of services.
- B. The Contractor shall provide and maintain an inspection system acceptable to the City covering the services under this Agreement. Complete records of all inspection work performed by the Contractor shall be maintained and made available to the City and for as long thereafter as the Agreement requires. The City has the right to inspect and test all services contemplated under this Agreement to the extent practicable at all times and places during the term of the Agreement. The City shall perform inspections and tests in a manner that will not unduly delay or interfere with Contractor's performance.
- C. If the City performs inspections or tests on the premises of the Contractor or a subcontractor, the Contractor shall furnish, and shall require subcontractors to furnish, at no increase in contract price, all reasonable facilities and assistance for the safe and convenient performance of such inspections or tests.
- D. If any part of the services do not conform with the requirements of this Agreement, the City may require the Contractor to re-perform the services in conformity with the requirements of this Agreement at no increase in contract amount. When the defects in services cannot be corrected by re-performance, the City may:
- (1) require the Contractor to take necessary action(s) to ensure that future performance conforms to the requirements of this Agreement; and
 - (2) reduce the contract price to reflect the reduced value of the services performed.
- E. If the Contractor fails to promptly re-perform the services or to take the necessary action(s) to ensure future performance in conformity with the requirements of this Agreement, the City may:
- (1) by contract or otherwise, perform the services and charge to the Contractor any cost incurred by the City that is directly related to the performance of such service; or
 - (2) terminate the contract for default.

33. **Insurance**

If the services contemplated under this Agreement will be performed on or in City facilities or property, Contractor shall maintain in force during the entire term of this Agreement, the following insurance coverage(s), naming the City as additional insured.

- **A.** Commercial General Liability insurance shall be written on an occurrence basis and be a broad as ISO Form CG 00 01 with limits not less than \$2,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 in the aggregate for claims against bodily injury, personal and advertising injury, and property damage. Said policy shall include broad form Contractual Liability coverage and be endorsed to name the City of Santa Fe their officials, officers, employees, and agents as additional insureds.
- **B. Business Automobile Liability** insurance for all owned, non-owned automobiles, with a combined single limit not less than \$1,000,000 per accident.
- **C. Broader Coverage and Limits**. The insurance requirements under this Agreement shall be the greater of (1) the minimum coverage and limits specified in this

Agreement, or (2) the broader coverage and maximum limits of coverage of any insurance policy or proceeds available to the Named Insured. It is agreed that these insurance requirements shall not in any way act to reduce coverage that is broader or that includes higher limits than the minimums required herein. No representation is made that the minimum insurance requirements of this Agreement are sufficient to cover the obligations of Contractor hereunder.

D. Contractor shall maintain the above insurance for the term of this Agreement and name the City as an additional insured and provide for 30 days cancellation notice on any Certificate of Insurance form furnished by Contractor. Such certificate shall also specifically state the coverage provided under the policy is primary over any other valid and collectible insurance and provide a waiver of subrogation.

34. **Impracticality of Performance**

A party shall be excused from performance under this Agreement for any period that the party is prevented from performing as a result of an act of God, strike, war, civil disturbance, epidemic, or court order, provided that the party has prudently and promptly acted to take any and all steps that are within the party's control to ensure performance. Subject to this provision, such non-performance shall not be deemed a default or a ground for termination.

35. <u>Invalid Term or Condition</u>

If any term or condition of this Agreement shall be held invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected and shall be valid and enforceable.

36. Enforcement of Agreement

A party's failure to require strict performance of any provision of this Agreement shall not waive or diminish that party's right thereafter to demand strict compliance with that or any other provision. No waiver by a party of any of its rights under this Agreement shall be effective unless express and in writing, and no effective waiver by a party of any of its rights shall be effective to waive any other rights.

37. Patent, Copyright and Trade Secret Indemnification

- A. The Contractor shall defend, at its own expense, the City against any claim that any product or service provided under this Agreement infringes any patent, copyright to trademark in the United States or Puerto Rico, and shall pay all costs, damages and attorneys' fees that a court finally awards as a result of any such claim. In addition, if any third party obtains a judgment against the City based upon Contractor's trade secret infringement relating to any product or services provided under this Agreement, the Contractor agrees to reimburse the City for all costs, attorneys' fees and amount of the judgment. To qualify for such defense and or payment, the City shall:
 - i. give the Contractor prompt written notice within 48 hours of any claim;
 - ii. allow the Contractor to control the defense of settlement of the claim; and

- iii. cooperate with the Contractor in a reasonable way to facilitate the defense or settlement of the claim.
- B. If any product or service becomes, or in the Contractor's opinion is likely to become the subject of a claim of infringement, the Contractor shall at its option and expense:
- i. provide the City the right to continue using the product or service and fully indemnify the City against all claims that may arise out of the City's use of the product or service:
 - ii. replace or modify the product or service so that it becomes non-infringing; or,
- iii. accept the return of the product or service and refund an amount equal to the value of the returned product or service, less the unpaid portion of the purchase price and any other amounts, which are due to the Contractor. The Contractor's obligation will be void as to any product or service modified by the City to the extent such modification is the cause of the claim.

38. Survival

The Agreement paragraphs titled "Patent, Copyright, Trademark, and Trade Secret Indemnification; Indemnification; and Limit of Liability" shall survive the expiration of this Agreement. Software licenses, leases, maintenance and any other unexpired Agreements that were entered into under the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall survive this Agreement.

39. **Disclosure Regarding Responsibility**

- A. Any prospective Contractor and any of its Principals who enter into a contract greater than sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) with any City for professional services, tangible personal property, services or construction agrees to disclose whether the Contractor, or any principal of the Contractor's company is presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, or declared ineligible for award of contract by any federal entity, state agency or local public body.
- B. Principal, for the purpose of this disclosure, means an officer, director, owner, partner, or a person having primary management or supervisory responsibilities within a business entity or related entities.
- C. The Contractor shall provide immediate written notice to the City if, at any time during the term of this Agreement, the Contractor learns that the Contractor's disclosure was at any time erroneous or became erroneous by reason of changed circumstances.
- D. A disclosure that any of the items in this requirement exist will not necessarily result in termination of this Agreement. However, the disclosure will be considered in the determination of the Contractor's responsibility and ability to perform under this Agreement. Failure of the Contractor to furnish a disclosure or provide additional information as requested will be grounds for immediate termination of this Agreement pursuant to the conditions set forth in Paragraph 7 of this Agreement.
 - E. Nothing contained in the foregoing shall be construed to require establishment of a

system of records in order to render, in good faith, the disclosure required by this document. The knowledge and information of a Contractor is not required to exceed that which is the normally possessed by a prudent person in the ordinary course of business dealings.

F. The disclosure requirement provided is a material representation of fact upon which reliance was placed when making an award and is a continuing material representation of the facts during the term of this Agreement. If during the performance of the contract, the Contractor is indicted for or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by any government entity (federal, state or local) with commission of any offenses named in this document the Contractor must provide immediate written notice to the City. If it is later determined that the Contractor knowingly rendered an erroneous disclosure, in addition to other remedies available to the Government, the City may terminate the involved contract for cause. Still further the City may suspend or debar the Contractor from eligibility for future solicitations until such time as the matter is resolved to the satisfaction of the City.

40. Suspension, Delay or Interruption of Work

The City may, without cause, order the Contractor, in writing, to suspend, delay or interrupt the work in whole or in part for such period of time as the City may determine. The contract sum and contract time shall be adjusted for increases in cost and/or time associated with Contractor's compliance therewith. Upon receipt of such notice, Contractor shall leave the jobsite and any equipment in a safe condition prior to departing. Contractor must assert rights to additional compensation within thirty (30) days after suspension of work is lifted and return to work is authorized. Any compensation requested for which entitlement is granted and the contract sum adjusted, shall have profit included (for work completed) and for cost only (not profit) for Contractor costs incurred directly tied to the suspension itself and not otherwise covered by Contract remedy. Any change in Total Compensation must be reflected in an Amendment executed pursuant to Section 8 of this Agreement.

41. **Notification**

Either party may give written notice to the other party in accordance with the terms of this Paragraph. Any written notice required or permitted to be given hereunder shall be deemed to have been given on the date of delivery if delivered by personal service or hand delivery or three (3) business days after being mailed.

The Railyard Park Conservancy has been advised that, due to the Covid crisis, there is only \$100,000 available for a FY2020-21 Professional Services Agreement. As such, this is an amendment to the

RPC's original Request for Funds (dated Feb 10, 2020). The following updated Scope of Services, to be

executed July 1, 2020 - June 30, 2021, reflects a \$100,000 PSA, should a \$150,000 PSA not be

- Implementation of Graze Days, a long-term collaboration with Quivira Coalition, Santa Fe Parks Department, and a local rancher to restore the park's native grasslands.
- Management and care of Railyard Park's Community Garden.
- Care for the Waffle Garden and its associated Acequia Nina: Planting, watering, weeding, and harvesting of vegetables in the public garden throughout the growing season.
- Care for Acequia Madre: Facilitation of clean-up in the spring.
- Management of a neighborhood volunteer crew that supports St. Francis Underpass with trash pick-up and weeding of the Underpass' first succession of weeds - mainly ragweed.
- Upkeep of the Native Bee House and continued habitat support for pollinators in the park.
- Oversight of the Community Room and the Railvard Park Conservancy tool shed.
- Facilitation of a volunteer Horticulture Advisory Committee: meetings and projects.
- Coordination with City of Santa Fe and the Santa Fe Conservation Trust to comply with the Conservation Easement in all gardening and programming tasks.
- Continued care and advocacy for all of the Railyard Park's gardens via community support.



Educational Programming in the Railyard Park

- Hosting of science-based field trips (virtually and in-person, as Covid allows): Includes the continuation of Roi/yard Days - a field trip collaboration with Railyard neighbors, SITE Santa Fe and Violet Crown.
- Continuation of a Grab-N-Go Climate Victory Garden "event" in lieu of Earth Day Celebration.
- Creation of online curriculum for teachers, families, and students through collaboration with Santa Fe's Community Educators Network.
- Using Graze Days as an opportunity to educate the public on prescribed grazing, reduced irrigation, soil diversity, and long-term sustainability of public landscapes in drought.
- Facilitation of the volunteer Children's Advisory Committee: meetings & projects.
- Interactive scavenger hunts and other activities for families that allows for social distancing and adheres to current state and local public health orders that restrict gathering sizes.

Public Art in the Railyard Park+ Plaza

- Overseeing insurance and conservation easement compliance for all art installations.
- Coordination with other stakeholders in the park such as Santa Fe Railyard Community Corporation, City of Santa Fe Parks Department, Santa Fe Conservation Trust, and City of Santa Fe Public Works.
- Facilitation of the volunteer Railyard Art Project Advisory Committee to jury proposals.
- Review of public art proposals and communication with artists after proposal submission.

Funds from a \$100,000 FY2020-21 PSA will support the RPC's general operating and administrative expenses associated with the Scope of Services detailed above. The funds support two full-time staff members who execute all RPC work. Remaining funds support a portion of rent for a small office. REPORT TO THE CITY FY 2019 - 2020

Introduction

The Railyard Park Conservancy (RPC) works year-round in order to provide high quality services to the City of Santa Fe. The RPC's mission is to provide community stewardship for the horticultural care, educational programming, and public art in the Railyard Park and Plaza.

The RPC's work entails maintaining the Park's diverse gardens and social spaces using community volunteers, offering free cultural and educational programming to the City's communities, and supporting the biological resilience of the Railyard Park's complex urban environment. The RPC works in collaboration with the City of Santa Fe, the Santa Fe Railyard Community Corporation, and the Santa Fe Conservation Trust to comply with the Railyard Park and Plaza's 13-acre Conservation Easement. RPC programming is always free and includes field trips, nature-play events, green job skills training, grassland restoration, adult and youth volunteer opportunities to care for over 28 cultivated gardens, temporary public art, homeless advocacy, an annual workshop series, and other community "asks", such as participation in Bike Week, the creation of grab n go educational programming for Santa Fe Public Schools, and a Climate Victory Garden seed give-away. The RPC acts as a conduit between the community and their public greenspace, Railyard Park.

It goes without saying that the 2019-2020 fiscal year has been unique among the RPC's ten-year history. On April 22, 2020 the RPC was issued a Stop Work Order (PO#22001215) due to the Covid crisis. The same day, the RPC's Executive Director and Board Chair consulted with Bob Siqueiros of Public Works. At that meeting, the RPC was given the okay to continue working, understanding that it would be without any funding from the City between April 15 – June 31, 2020. The Park's plants, gardens, and biological systems do not stop for Covid and the RPC is proud to have been able to continue to serve the community in partnership with the City and Railyard Stakeholders through this crisis. Below are details outlining RPC work between July 1, 2019 – June 30, 2020. The RPC's Board of Directors and Staff thank the City for their continued support

History

It became clear in the early design stages of the Railyard Park that goals of environmental sustainability and community engagement could not be maintained by the City's Park Department alone. The Trust for Public Land and a citizen-based committee tasked with overseeing the construction of the Park decided that a distinct non-profit stewardship organization, in partnership with the City, could provide the missing constellation of services — modeling New York's Central Park Conservancy. Founded as the Railyard Stewards in September 2010, the organization changed its name to the Railyard Park Conservancy (RPC) in 2016 to reflect its growth in depth and responsibilities. Since the organization's inception, the City of Santa Fe has supported the RPC's work with a Professional Services Agreement (PSA) to provide community stewardship for the horticultural care, educational programming, and public art in the Railyard Park.

The Railyard Park Conservancy Staff, Board of Directors, & Advisory Committees

The RPC executes its mission using a small staff and a large cadre of community volunteers. RPC work is informed by a volunteer Board of Directors and four volunteer Advisory Committees.



Horticultural Care

Yardmaster Adult Volunteers – Yardmasters are the adult volunteers who perform year-round gardening tasks within the Park and at the Underpass. This largely retired, highly skilled group takes care of the smaller details. They meticulously prune the trumpet vines, water struggling trees, dead-head roses, and work directly with RPC Staff to keep an eye on the Park. Yardmaster programming shifted mid-year from hosting *group* volunteer sessions to facilitating *independent* gardening opportunities due to Covid.

Youth In-Service Volunteers – The RPC hosts weekly Youth-In-Service programs through local schools and church groups. The RPC facilitated Youth-In-Service programming through March 6th, 2020 - just ahead of the school closure announcement from the Governor. Despite this, youth still contributed over half of the volunteer hours for FY2019-20.

Team Underapss – This group of neighbors meet up about once a month to tackle weeds and trash at the new St. Francis Underpass. The RPC supports these volunteers with coordination of debris pick-up, tracking of work, and tool support.

Community Garden – The RPC facilitated two rounds of Community Gardeners representing a half of two growing seasons. The RPC coordinates debris pick-up, spring planting, a watering schedule, and fall clean-up for 11 gardeners in 2019 and 9 gardeners in 2020. In summer of 2020, the community garden got repeatedly vandalized and community gardeners repaired the gate.

Graze Days – There is a critical need to conserve water throughout New Mexico and this need extends to public spaces. In order to exemplify water conservation in Santa Fe, the RPC embarked on a long-term grassland restoration project, in collaboration with Quivira Coalition, in 2018. Graze Days utilizes prescribed grazing with sheep and goats to bring two acres of the Santa Fe Railyard Park back to an intended native grassland state. This project eliminates the need for regular irrigation and mechanical mowing. FY2019-20 grazing sessions occurred Oct.29-31, 2019 and Feb.28-30, 2020. Summer 2020 was the first year that native wildflowers and grasses were able to go to seed due to a cessation of mowing.

Elm Replacement – When the cottonwood trees along the Park's Cottonwood Bosque were planted, it was understood that once they were established, the large Siberian elms would be removed to allow the new trees to thrive along Acequia Madre. In January 2019, the long-time project to remove elms from along the park's Cottonwood Bosque, finally came to fruition. Working with the City and the Santa Fe Conservation Trust, a tree service removed nine elm trees that were compromising the vitality of the nearby cottonwoods. Volunteers have kept the saplings trimmed back where the stumps remain.

Railyard Movie Night Park Clean-Up - Working with Amp Concerts and the Railyard Community Corporation, the RPC facilitated an extremely popular Park Clean-Up ahead of the August screening of Wall-E.

YCC Volunteers – The RPC hosted a crew of Youth Conservation Corp volunteers during the summer of 2019. This group uses American Sign Language to communicate and the RPC coordinates with New Mexico School for the Deaf and Rocky Mountain Youth Corp to host this amazing crew. Their most impressive feat from summer 2019 was removing 10 years of sediment from the Waffle Garden's Acequia and replacing rotted out logs from the Children's Play Area.

Educational Programming

Outdoor Science Classroom – In addition to hosting weekly Youth-In-Service sessions, the RPC also facilitated 13 field trips in 2019 and 2020, serving 368 students. Each field trip prioritizes direct interaction with nature, child-directed play, and is focused on supporting learning associated with ecology, chemistry, biology, and environmental science. The last field trip that the RPC hosted before the pandemic was during Graze Days in February of 2020.

Educational Programming, cont.

Sand Play Saturday – The RPC hosted eight sessions of this popular nature-based play program in the Park's sandbox during FY19-20. Designed for kids 0-4 and their families, the program was temporarily suspended in summer 2020 due to the pandemic.

Grab N Go Educational Programming – In collaboration with the Community Educator's Network, Santa Fe Public Schools, and other community partners, the RPC created a Design Your Own Park project for students stuck at home over the summer. Over 400 6th-9th grade students received free Design Your Own Park program materials and instructions in English and Spanish in June 2020.

Educational Programming, cont.

Climate Victory Garden Grab N Go—This project was executed during April & May of 2020. In lieu of a citywide 2020 Earth Day Celebration, the RPC and event collaborators teamed up to safely pass out Climate Victory Garden "kits" to the public. Inspired by the United States' Victory Garden movement of the 1940s, kits were aimed to give individuals an opportunity to produce healthy, local food and take action against climate change through the carbon-sequestering principles of regenerative agriculture. This project was made possible through collaboration with the New Mexico Healthy Soils Advocacy Group, the Santa Fe Children's Museum, Santa Fe Indian Center, Alas de Agua Art Collective, Communities in Schools, and local climate activists. Over 500 kits were distributed with info packets in English and Spanish.


Workshops – The RPC hosted 17 workshops during the summer and fall of 2019. Workshop topics included: Mushroom Cultivation, Community Science, Labyrinth Walks, Drumming, Nature-Based Play for Early Childhood Educators, Bee Hives, and a series of Poetry Classes with Santa Fe's Poet Laureate, Elizabeth Jacobson. In June of 2020, the RPC hosted a virtual Community Science Training Workshop. Like all RPC programming, workshops are free and open to the public.

Public Art

Bike Month – The RPC was slated to host workshops as a part of May 2020's Bike Week that was being coordinated by Santa Fe's MPO and other organizations. As Covid made it clear that plans to gather were not going to be possible, organizers shifted their focus. The RPC contributed to the, no longer *week*-long, but instead *month*-long event, by creating a Public Art Bike Ride – one for the Midtown/Railyard and one for the Southside of Santa Fe.

Grass Ballet – This installation by local artist, Owen William Fritts, was installed in early March 2020 (removed August 2020). Located near the Rail Gardens in the Arroyo next to SITE, Grass Ballet featured "blades of grass" that are inspired by the movement of wind through grass fields.

Railyard Park 2019 Photo Contest – Since 2017, the RPC has hosted an annual photo contest in the fall. The 2019 photo contest explored the categories: Abstract, Nature, People/Events, and a Youth Category. Fifteen prize packages were given out in November 2019 at an Award's Ceremony hosted by Violet Crown.

Longview – Installed June-October 2019, Edna is a 35-foot polar bear made from recycled car hoods. Created by Santa Fe artist, Don Kennell, *Longview*, has been the RPC's most engaging, beloved, and storytelling piece – speaking to the march of climate change on our environment.

FREE FILM USA - Artist Neil Hamamoto brought an airstream trailer to the Railyard in October 2019. The trailer had been converted into a darkroom and was traversing the USA. Parked for three days at the Railyard Water Tower, his team distributed free film for participants to document Santa Fe. Film was developed on site and is compiled into a book showcasing over 30 cities.
